

Cranberry Forecast

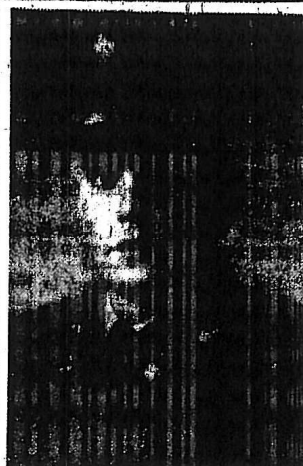
