See Chance For Ending Ship Strike

Negotiations in the 13-day-old east coast longshoremen's strike held some hope today, but the top federal mediator declared "I'm not predicting anything."

There were reports in Washington that the AFL Longshore union had received a welfare plan offer from employers in addition to the 10-cent hourly wage increase proposal just before the New York talks recessed Saturday.

The union has halved its demand for a 50-cent hourly hike for its 65,000 workers whose present base rate is \$1.75. Quit Crew

Meanwhile, shipping was tied up from Maine to Virginia. At Southampton, Eng., where approximately one third of the giant liner Queen Elizabeth's crew struck in sympathy with the American longshoremen, the crew members agreed to return to their ship.

The Cunard White Star Line promised that the Queen Elizabeth would not sail until the longshoremens' strike is settled, and would not go to Halifax.



Two Dissent To Verdicts In War Trial

Tokyo $-(\mathcal{P})$ - Only two representatives of the 11-nations forming the Far Eastern commission dissented today to the Tokyo war trials verdicts. The other nine said the verdicts satisfied them.

B. N. Chakravarty of India and Baron E. J. Lewe Van Aduard of the Netherlands supported the dissenting opinions of the judges on the international tribunal from their countries.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur, Allied occupation commander, called the representatives together to discuss the verdict of the court which sentenced former Premier Hideki Tojo and six others to hang, 16 to life terms and two to shorter prison sentences.

The Indian judge, R. B. Pal, had expressed the opinion all of the 25 Japanese defendants should be freed. The Netherlands judge, Bernard Victor A. Roling, had said some of the death sentences were too severe.

A few minutes after the meeting, MacArthur issued a statement through an aide, saying he had taken under consideration the advice of the representatives together with the appeals of the defendants and petitions filed in their behalf. He said he hoped to have his final decision leady later this week.


MacArthur has the light to reduce any of the sentences but he may not increase any of them.






