Twin Soviet Spearheads Threaten to Outflank German Capital London - (P) - German and

Russian guns dueled across the Oder today and Marshal Zhukov moved First White Russian Army tanks and infantry to the river line along a front of 140 miles, threatening to outflank Berlin through north Germany as well as in the south. The German high command

said violent Russian attacks were
