When I asked her to name some of the weaknesses of women players, she said, "Why do you pick on women particularly? I find that carelessness is the weakness of any player. If you take time to think, it is not hard to play good bridge. Don't try to be spectacular, but don't make careless losing plays like this one." And she gave me the hand shown today.
