Dr. Carey Cronheis Becomes President of Beloit College

Beloit, Wis., (AP)—Dr. Carey Cronheis, professor of geology at the University of Chicago, will assume the presidency of Beloit college on September 1, trustees announced at a special meeting today.

Dr. Cronheis, who joined the Chicago faculty in 1931 and became a full professor in 1941, succeeded the late Irving Maurer, who died in February, 1942.

W. Bradley Tyrrell, college vice president who has administered school affairs since Maurer's death, reverts to the vice presidency and also becomes treasurer.

Cronheis, 43, and the father of two high school girls, graduated from Denison college in Ohio, took his master's degree at the University of Kansas and his Ph. D. at Harvard. He is the fifth president Beloit has had.

Prominent in national scientific circles, Cronheis is a consultant to the national defense research committee and served as a civilian advisor for the war department on a foreign military mission.
