**Present Citations to  
 Families of War Dead**

Gold star citations—"emblems of  
 devotion to the highest duty of  
 citizenship"—have been presented  
 to the families of the late Lieut.  
 Richard G. Rosebush, Port Ed-  
 wards, and Julius Rude jr., U. S. N.,  
 Route 1, Wisconsin Rapids, by  
 Charles Hagerstrom post No. 9,  
 American Legion.

Lieut. Rosebush was killed in the  
 crash of an army airplane in Colo-  
 rado last April, while Julius Rude  
 jr., a second class fireman, lost his  
 life in the sinking of the U. S.  
 destroyer Truxton last February.

The engraved citations, each de-  
 clared that "this death occurred in  
 order that others might live," were  
 presented to the families by offi-  
 cers of Charles Hagerstrom post.

**Hitchhike Slayer, 16,  
 Sent to Institution**

Midland, Mich.—(AP)—A 14-year-  
 old hitch-hiker was committed in  
 Midland county probate court today  
 to the boys vocational school at  
 Lansing for the slaying of Clyde  
 N. Valentine, 39-year-old Detroit  
 bartender, last Sunday.

Under the terms of the commit-  
 ment by Probate Judge D. J. LaGoe  
 the boy will remain in the school  
 until he is 19 years of age. What  
 may be done after that time was  
 not clear to Midland county law  
 enforcement officers.

**Heavy Penalty Provided**  
 The section of the sabotage act  
 under which Glandt was charged  
 carries a maximum fine of \$10,000  
 or maximum imprisonment of 30  
 years, or both.

The act says that when the nation  
 is at war "whoever, with intent to  
 injure, interfere with or obstruct the  
 United States in preparing for or  
 carrying on the war . . . shall will-  
 fully make or cause to be made in a  
 defective manner, or attempt to  
 make or cause to be made in a de-  
 fective manner, any war material of  
 any tool, implement, machine, uten-  
 sil or receptacle used or employed  
 in making, producing, manufactur-  
 ing or repairing any such war ma-  
 terial shall, upon conviction," be  
 subject to fine, imprisonment or  
 both.

**Pomainville to  
 Run for Coroner  
 on GOP Ticket**

The Wood county Republican  
 committee announced today the se-  
 lection of Dr. Harold Pomainville,  
 Nekoosa, as candidate for the office  
 of Wood county coroner on the Re-  
 publican ticket at the November  
 election.

Dr. Pomainville will take the place  
 of Dr. Rogers E. Garrison, former  
 coroner, now serving with the Unit-  
 ed States army air corps in Califor-  
 nia. Dr. Garrison, who entered the  
 service after filing for the office,  
 was nominated by the Republicans  
 at the September primary.

Dr. Garrison has filed his declina-  
 tion of the nomination, the commit-  
 tee announcement said, and his suc-  
 cessor as the party candidate was  
 named by the committeemen at a  
 meeting here Monday night. Statu-  
 tes provide for a substitute nomi-  
 nee to be chosen by the statutory  
 committee of a party.

 publicans a full slate of county offi-  
 cers for the November balloting.  
 The meeting laid plans to stage a  
 series of 15 rallies in the county, the  
 first of which will be held next Sat-  
 urday night at Pittsville. Free mov-
