"Coffee will be available for every person over 15 when rationing starts," an Office of Price Administration spokesman said, "but we're hoping that housewives won't cash in all the family's coupons at once right at the start."

"Just buy the amount that you need. We can give absolute assurance there will be enough for all."

The first coffee ration may be purchased next Sunday or thereafter by presenting stamp number 27 from the sugar ration book, or ration book number 1. Any person who has more than one pound on hand Nov. 28 may not purchase coffee until the excess is used up. Sometime around the first of the year stamps covering the excess stocks of coffee in family cupboards on Nov. 28 will be removed from the book.

Sugar ration books held by persons who were under 15 years of age when sugar rationing registration took place last May will not be valid for coffee purchases.

FORMER AUBURNDALE RESIDENT DROWNED

Dies at Honolulu, Was in U. S. Merchant Marine

Robert Borland Guthrie, 33, a former Auburndale resident, was drowned at Honolulu on March 20 of this year, according to word received by the North Wood County Selective Service Board today.

He was a radio operator in the U. S. Merchant Marine at the time of his death, his father, H. W. Guthrie, Milwaukee, reported to the draft office.

Born on June 29, 1908, Guthrie was a radio operator at the WJEL tower in Auburndale at the time he registered for selective service in October, 1940, and made his home in Auburndale.

Guthrie was unmarried.

Abolition Move

Washington —(AP)— The Senate prepared to go through the motions today of debating abolition of State poll taxes as a prerequisite for voting in Federal elections, although even its supporters conceded the measure was marked for the legislative graveyard.

Balked by a seven-day filibuster carried on by Senators from southern poll tax states, proponents finally succeeded in bringing the bill formally before the Senate under the terms of an involved "gentleman's agreement" calling for a vote at 12 noon (CWT) Monday on a motion to limit debate.

Adoption of such a motion would require two-thirds approval of those present and even administration strategists who have fought to obtain action on the measure acknowledged that upwards of 40 of the 96 Senators would oppose limiting debate.

SIX FLYERS KILLED IN FLORIDA PLANE CRASH

West Palm Beach, Fla. — (AP) — The Army today announced that two officers and a crew of four were killed in the crash yesterday of a light Army bomber taking off from the Morrison field headquarters of the Army Air Transport Command's Caribbean wing. None of the dead were from Wisconsin.
