Eisenhower was loudly cheered by more than 500 persons who met him at the Las Vegas airport, and by several thousand who stood in 102 degree heat along the road to Hoover Dam. He returned the cheers with huge grins and waves from an open convertible in which he rode with Nevada's Gov. Charles H. Russell.

Gov. Russell is a Republican but not a member of the Nevada delegation.

At the dam, Ike was greeted by Bureau of Reclamation officials who showed him the works. The general was impressed.

"This is a wonderful accomplishment," he said. "It combines flood control, irrigation and power in one project, and it was not taken out of the taxpayers' pockets but is self-paying."

Groups Want Hill for Senate

At Milwaukee, Charles Ashley, chairman of the Milwaukee Republican Party organization who also is considered a possible opponent of McCarthy, said he attended the meeting as a guest although he is not a member of either group.

He said it was his understanding that the groups would ask Hill to be a candidate but that nothing was settled yet.

Asked if he would be a candidate against Sen. McCarthy, Ashley said that if "I consider the demand sufficient I might consider it."

Former Gov. Rennebohm was reported to have been contacted by the groups and asked if he would run but declined.

The former chief executive, who dropped out of public life two years ago because of ill health, said that he had no comment on the meeting other than to say that he did not attend it.

It also was reported that Leonard Schmitt, Merrill attorney, informed the meeting that if Hill or some other strong candidate did not enter the race against McCarthy, he would do so.

Funeral services have been arranged for 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon at St. Paul's Lutheran Church for Pfc. Neal W. Haferman, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. William T. Haferman, 1111 11th Ave. N., who was killed in action in Korea on July 29, 1950.

The Rev. E. H. Walther is to officiate and burial will take place in Forest Hill Cemetery with military rites by Buckley-Baldwin Post No. 2534, Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Pfc. Haferman was born in Wisconsin Rapids on March 30, 1930, and attended the West Side Lutheran and Lincoln High Schools, graduating in 1948. Prior to enlisting in the army in January, 1949, he had been employed by the Water & Light Department for seven months. He was sent to Japan in May, 1950, and to Korea shortly after the Korea war broke out, being reported missing in August.

He is survived by his parents and three brothers, Roy, Glenn and William Jr., all of Wisconsin Rapids.

The body is to arrive Wednesday evening under military escort and will be taken to the Krohn & Bernard Funeral Home, where friends may call Thursday morning until time of services.
