LAST RIGHTS FOR DONALD G. HENRY

The body of Private Donald George Henry was interred at Calvary cemetery this morning with full military rites in charge of the American Legion at the graveside following a requiem high mass at SS. Peter and Paul Catholic church.

Under a grey sky, hundreds massed about the grave, where the Rev. Louis Paquette of Vesper, chaplain in the U. S. army reserve, and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William Reding officiated at the solemn military and religious rituals for the dead. Drawn to the scene by the tragedy of the young National Guardsman's death were scores who mourned, though strangers, with relatives and friends.

Requiem Mass at Church

The body lay in state at the Krohn and Berard funeral chapel until this morning when it was taken under escort of the Legion color guard, pallbearers, firing squad, and honorary pallbearers, to SS. Peter and Paul church where the Rev. A. F. Bauman sang the mass and preached over the flag-draped casket.

Father Bauman, reminding of the inevitability of death even for "such a young man who died in his best years," pointed to the symbolism of religious objects and of "the flag" the emblem of patriotism which serve to relieve the sorrow of the mourners at the bier and spur the witnesses to live up to Christmity's teachings.

A long procession followed the hearse to the cemetery, to be met there by hundreds who had gathered at the grave. Cars lined Spring street on both sides for blocks and others were parked on cemetery roads. The rites were conducted beneath a canvas awning.

Present Flag to Parents

Legion Commander J. J. Plzak and the Legion chaplain, Fred Burt, folded the casket flag at the climax of the ceremonies and delivered it to the sorrowing parents. Under command of Legionnaire C. H. Babcock the firing squad delivered the traditional volleys above the grave and taps, sounded from a distance by Buglers Earl Hein and Matt Marshall, closed the ceremony.

Lewis Sought "Deal" With FDR, Claim

Akron, O., Oct. 26—(P)—Frank Grillo, secretary-treasurer of the United Rubber Workers of America (C. I. O.), said today John L. Lewis told union officers three weeks ago he was holding an endorsement of President Roosevelt "in his pocket" to gain two objectives.

Grillo said the objectives were: A denial of government defense contracts to certain firms, including Bethlehem Steel and Ford Motor; and the reappointment of Chairman J. Warren Madden to the national labor relations board.

In an interview with the Akron Beacon Journal, Grillo said Lewis—who last night endorsed Republican Wendell L. Willkie—remarked that he could "under no circumstances" endorse Willkie for president.

Grillo quoted the C. I. O. chief-tain as saying he wanted certain things and thought he could get them by "holding the endorsement in my pocket."

Grillo reported Lewis said: "You fellows know the score. You know Willkie's background and you know I couldn't possibly endorse him. We know there isn't any comparison between the two men."

The meeting at which Lewis made the remarks was held in the C. I. O. leader's Washington office October 2, Grillo said.
