### State traffic death toll stands at 456

The death of a Fond du Lac county man early today raised Wisconsin's 1968 traffic toll to 456, compared with 376 on this same date a year ago, when the state set a record.

Ralph R. Coffman, 24, Oakfield, died this morning when his car left Fond du Lac County Highway D near Oakfield and crashed in a ditch.

Shiela Badzinski, 16, Milwaukee, was killed Tuesday when the car she was in crossed the center line and crashed into the guard rail on the opposite side of S. 27th Street bridge, police said.

### Disclose how Vesper sailor was stabbed

Circumstances surrounding the death of a 22-year-old Vesper sailor in the Philippines last Sunday were made public by the U.S. Navy today.

The victim, James R. Iwanski, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Iwanski, Vesper, who were notified of his death on Tuesday in a message from the Defense Department.

The Associated Press in a dispatch from Manila this morning quoted naval authorities as reporting that Iwanski, a machinist's mate third class serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Bon Homme Richard, received fatal stab wounds while on shore leave in Olongapo City, which adjoins the big U.S. naval base at Subic Bay.

They said he and a woman companion were attacked in a night club by a knife-wielding youth who was identified as a cashier of the club. The woman also was fatally stabbed.

Olongapo police said jealousy was the apparent motive for the double murder.

Iwanski had been in the Navy since July 1964. His body is to be brought to the Taylor Funeral Home here.

tions with the United States, entered its second month today with another terror shelling of the capital.

The 18-shell barrage during the night killed five Vietnamese civilians and wounded 21. It was the second successive night Saigon was shelled.

One report of the Viet Cong's plans for intermittent attacks on Saigon came from a Viet Cong cell leader captured in Cholon week ago. South Vietnamese military sources said he told interrogators: "The Viet Cong will launch an attack on Saigon from May 25 to June 5. The Viet Cong will then take a 10-day rest and then attack Saigon again from June 15 to June 20."

In the central highlands, meanwhile, allied troops repulsed two North Vietnamese ambushes of a 50-truck U.S. military convoy 15 miles north of Pleiku. Two Americans and 53 North Vietnamese were reported killed.

U.S. jet fighter-bombers and helicopters helped drive of the ambushers. The enemy rocket and rifle fire damaged about 20 of the convoy's trucks.
