MADISON (AP) — A \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest of coed Christine Schindl's slayer has been offered by the head of the University of Wisconsin police.

Ralph Hanson said Monday the lack of "even a solid lead" in the slaying of Miss Schindl nine days ago prompted him to ask university officials to arrange for the removal of all police officials had no immediate comment.

Hanson said police still lacked a motive or a weapon in the case. The body of Miss Rothschild, a 19-year-old freshman from Chicago, was found stabbed in a room near a classroom building a week ago Sunday. Hanson said, "But we're satisfied that we are doing everything possible to find it."

New fighting erupts in center of Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — The Viet Cong sent fresh troops into Saigon today on the heels of the heaviest enemy shelling so far of the harassed capital district. U.S. sources conceded that the enemy "certainly could keep the fighting going for quite a while."

New fighting broke out only a mile and a half north of President Nguyen Van Thieu's Independence Palace, in the heart of Saigon, while government forces were still battling other enemy troops for the fifth day in the western part of the capital and in the northeastern suburb of Gia Dinh, 2½ miles from the city's center.

Military spokesmen reported that South Vietnamese marines

and rangers, spearheaded by a column of tanks, mounted a massive attack on North Vietnamese and Viet Cong troops in Gia Dinh this afternoon. The spokesmen said the government troops overran Viet Cong positions and drove the enemy back a mile.

In the western part of the capital, the Chinese section called Cholon, government forces were still trying to root out rocket-firing, sniping enemy troops holed up in a residential area three miles from the presidential palace. Intelligence sources had estimated 15 to 20 guerrillas were holed up, but a defector reported 200 enemy in the area. U.S. sources said there were reports that five-man Viet Cong

cells were infiltrating into the capital in civilian clothes. The reports said the cells were told to hide in "safe" houses as back-up forces.

Senior U.S. officers say the intensified pressure on Saigon is part of a plan to influence the Paris talks—between the United States and North Vietnam.

During the night the Saigon area was hit by some 40 enemy rockets between about 1:30 and 2:30 a.m. It was the biggest enemy bombardment of the war in the area, and as it began the city's sirens sounded for the first time to alert the 3 million inhabitants. But only 10 persons were reported injured and damage was comparatively minor.

Eighteen of the rockets landed around a company from the U.S. 9th Infantry Division five miles south of the center of Saigon, but no American casualties were reported.

As an indication of the serious view the Saigon government took of the situation in the capital, it today appointed a major general, Nguyen Van Minh, to direct the defense of the capital military district. This had been one of the duties of the commander of the 3rd military corps area, which also includes the 11 provinces around Saigon, and he delegated day-to-day operations in the city to a colonel.

Government troops reported repulsing several enemy ground attacks on night defensive positions 20 miles north of Saigon and killing 24 enemy soldiers and capturing four. Government casualties were reported light.

Vesper serviceman dies of stab wounds in Philippines

Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Iwanski, Vesper, were notified this morning of the death of their 22-year-old son, James Robert Iwanski, machinist's mate third class, which occurred Sunday at Subic Bay in the Philippines. The Defense Department said that death resulted from stab wounds, but gave no details concerning the manner in which the wounds were sustained.

The body is to be brought to the Taylor Funeral Home here, where funeral arrangements are pending.

Machinist's Mate Iwanski enlisted in the Navy July 29, 1964,

and had served in Vietnam on three occasions.

He was born July 10, 1945, at Wausau and graduated from Pittsville High School in 1964. He held membership in St. James Catholic Church, Vesper.

Surviving, in addition to his parents, are four brothers, Gerald, Roger, Robert and Thomas, all at home; four sisters, Mrs. Richard Horswill and Janel Iwanski, both of Milwaukee, and Marilyn and Mary Lou, at home; and his maternal grandfather, Telesfor Chojnowski, Michigan City, Ind. One sister preceded him in death.
