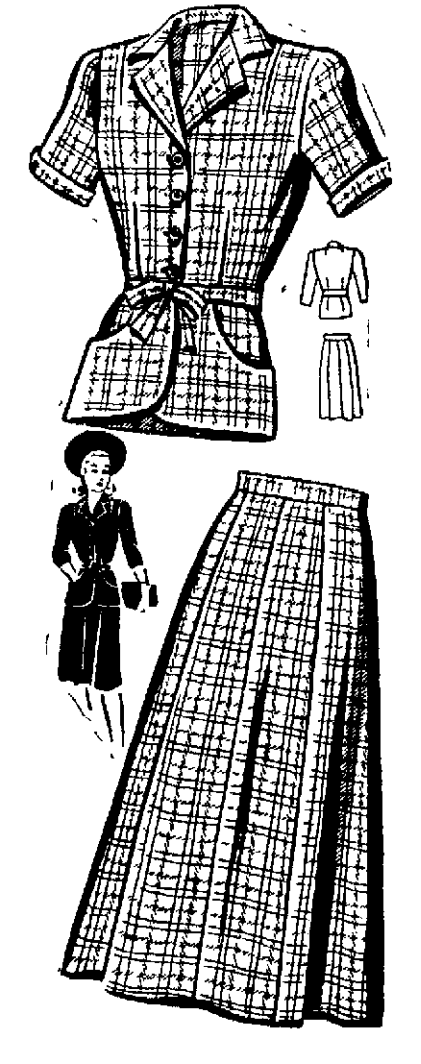
While Corporal Bliese is stationed at Peterson field, the couple is residing at 815 North Weber in Colorado Springs.
