no military victory, no political conclusion." It could bring catastro-phe to America, he added, "with no salvation to Europe."

In his second major foreign policy speech in recent weeks, Hoover reg speech in recent weeks, Hoover urged emphasis on production of planes, ships and munitions and sending of supplies to nations "doing their utmost to defend themselveя."

He proposed that Chiang Kni-shek be freed "to do what he wishes to China" and that the U. S. "furnish him with munitions."


