Freeman Tells of Food Stamp Plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman announced Tuesday the government's food stamp plan for increasing food buying power of low income consumers will be extended to 38 additional areas in 36 states, including Wisconsin, by next June 30.

Most of the new areas are rural. Freeman said some 600,000 additional consumers will be eligible for the program which already is helping more than two million Americans.

Under the plan, eligible consumers get government stamps usable for the purchase of food at regular retail stores. These stamps are redeemed by the department through the banking system.

Raise Social Security Benefits in February

An average increase of 1 1/2 per cent in social security benefits will be paid beginning with the February 1968 benefit checks, it was announced today by R. Thomas Williams, acting district manager of the Wisconsin Rapids Social Security office.

The higher benefits are provided for by 1967 amendments to the Social Security Act. Increases will be taken care of automatically, Williams said and it is not necessary to contact the Social Security office to obtain them.

Detailed information on amendments will be available in pamphlet form within a week at the office here.
