Planning for Celebration

Preliminary plans for an elaborate Labor day celebration at Witter field were discussed during a meeting of the Central Labor union last night. President Harry Klappa reported that many free acts and rides already have been booked for the 2-day affair, September 1 and 2, and that various concession rights will be sold.

Irma Fehrmann was named chairman of a committee to assemble material for a proposed special labor edition of the Wisconsin Rapids Daily Tribune, which drew the unanimous favor of the group.

Jack Sullivan was chosen to attend the annual School for Workers at the University of Wisconsin, a 2-week session beginning August 4.

The Central body legislative committee submitted a list of candidates for labor endorsement and urged that union members vote in the primary August 13.

Melvin Laird, Jr., Marshfield, state senator candidate, and Vernon M. Kelly, seeking reelection as county treasurer, both Republicans, spoke at the meeting.

Buy Land for New 13 Route

Acquisition of right-of-way for the proposed relocation of Highway 13 between Pittsville and Marshfield is progressing satisfactorily, County Highway Commissioner Russell Sullivan said today, with purchase of all but about six miles of the required lands already negotiated.

It is hoped that state approval of the project will be forthcoming in time to permit construction of the 16-mile stretch of highway in 1947. To obtain federal aid for the project it is necessary that the right-of-way be purchased and cleared before bids are sought.

Right-of-way at the Marshfield end of the project was acquired some time ago, extending 5½ miles south of Marshfield and 2 miles west on Highway 10.

The county highway commission is now engaged in negotiating for right-of-way from Highway 73 northwest of Pittsville to the Far View school near Klondike, a stretch of 8½ miles. According to Sullivan, about 2½ miles of this stretch has been purchased, leaving 6 miles still to be bought. This section of the proposed relocation follows the route of old County Trunk T.

Illness Fatal To Wisconsin Rapids Soldier

S/Sgt. Richard A. Kruger, 26, a resident of Wisconsin Rapids all his life, died at Percy Jones hospital in Battle Creek, Mich., Thursday night following a long illness. The body will be brought here from Battle Creek and funeral arrangements are to be in charge of Baker mortuary.

Sergeant Kruger, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Kruger, 310 Eighth avenue north, was inducted into the air forces August 7, 1942. While serving in the Egyptian area, he was taken ill and returned to the receiving hospital in Atlantic City, N. J., in July, 1945. He was transferred to the Percy Jones hospital last December.

Prior to entering service, he was employed at the Biron division of Consolidated Water Power and Paper company. He graduated from Lincoln high school with the class of 1938.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by two brothers, Charles and Edward, at home.

MARKET RECOVERS

Edwin J. Haas, town of Sigel, chairman of the Wood county highway committee, announced today that a compromise arrangement had been reached in the relocation of roads necessary to construction of the Little Eau Pleine reservoir and predicted favorable action at a meeting of the board Tuesday. Although the new plan entails more expense than originally contemplated, it is believed that approval will enable the Wisconsin Valley Improvement company to proceed with the enterprise.

Haas, who said that he and members of his committee conferred with Consolidated Water Power and Paper company officials Thursday following announcement by George W. Mead, president of the Improvement company, that the \$2,500,000 project had been dropped, presented the new proposal to residents affected in the town of Milladore last evening and said that it was acceptable to a majority of the landowners.

Previously, farmers in the north Wood county area registered objections to moving a 5-mile section of County Trunk H a mile to the south, as requested by the Improvement company, on the basis of inconvenience. The highway committee at a special meeting July 2 recommended that the petition be denied and the report was adopted with only one dissenting vote. Meanwhile, supervisors of Portage and Marathon counties, in which the proposed 20 by 9-mile water storage reservoir also will lie, approved vacating or changing roads as required.

Would Be Impractical

Mead revealed Wednesday that maintaining County Trunk H in its present location instead of re-locating it would make the undertaking "unsound economically" and that the company had decided to discard the entire project unless the Wood county board reconsidered its action.

Haas said today that a compromise arrangement had been worked out under which only two miles of the section in question would be re-located and that final details would be worked out in a conference Monday morning. "I cannot, of course, speak for the other supervisors," Haas stated, "but the committee will recommend acceptance of the plan and I believe the board will respond favorably."
