On the Naktong River Line in Korea—(P)—American air and South Korean ground units teamed Tuesday in near-perfect support to blast a strong force of Reds holding key hill-top positions in the see-saw fighting north of Waegwan.

The enemy strongholds were pinpointed by South Koreans who sent U.S. air power to the targets by waving white cloths and using smoke-

bombs.

The South Koreans—until help came—had contained the Reds with a thin line of infantry atrung around the strategic heights which over-look the Naktong river near Wangwan.

South Korean estimates placed the number of enemy at between 200 and 2,000 men. The number was not area. determined but the South Koreans knew they didn't have enough troops or firepower to handle an attack.

So they asked a U. S. First Calvary command post to call in Amer-
