For Cpl. Perham
In Rock Island

Reburial services for Cpl. James M. Perham, formerly of Wisconsin Rapids, who met death with four other paratroopers in a motorcycle accident while on duty with the American Intelligence division near Ludwigslust, Germany, on May 30, 1945, will be held at 10:30 Monday morning at Rock Island National cemetery, Rock Island, Ill.

The body of Cpl. Perham, who was graduated from Lincoln High school here with the class of 1941, was returned again to the Hahn Victory from temporary internment in Holland.

Cpl. Perham enlisted in the regular army in 1942, serving eight weeks at Camp Robinson, Ark., before being selected for the army war college in Washington, D. C. After several months there he joined the paratroops, serving with the 504th regiment, 82nd airborne division, and left for Africa in April, 1943, participating in the Sicilian campaign, Salerno, Naples and Cassino engagements. Sent to Holland, he took part in the Battle of the Bulge and crossed the Rhine and Elbe rivers, commuting with the Russians on D. day. He had 371 combat days, 20 combat jumps and was the recipient of the bronze star and infantry combat medal.

Surviving are his mother, Mrs. E. L. Reidell, Oshkosh; his father, M. W. Perham, Eau Claire; one sister, Judith Ann, Oshkosh, and one brother, Marshall R. Perham, a June graduate Mexico City university, Mexico.

World News Briefs

Portsmouth, Eng. —(AP)— Ten U. S. warships, led by the 45,000-ton battleship Missouri, dropped anchor at dawn today for an official visit to Britain. Four thousand officers and men and 1,200 Annapolis midshipmen making a six-weeks training cruise are aboard.

Washington —(AP)— Southern fried chicken dipped in a DDT batter sent a housewife and her two lunch-
eon guests to a hospital yesterday with acute cases of food poisoning.

The housewife, Mrs. Helen L. Brown, 39, told hospital authorities she mistook the DDT for flour. She said she even garnished some potato patties with it.

Seoul —(AP)— President Syngman Rhee today asserted that U. S. troops could quit his South Korean republic at any time because his people were prepared for attack from the Communist north.

Most American troops probably will be gone by the end of the month. Five hundred U. S. officers and men will remain to train the young republic's army.

Long Branch, N. J. —(AP)— Pre-mature quadruplets — two boys and two girls — all died within 15 minutes of each other this morning a little more than 10 hours after they were born.

Their mother was Mrs. Raymond Caffrey of Union Beach, N. J. Monmouth Memorial hospital, where the

quadruplets were born, said M. Caffrey had been five months pregnant.

New York —(AP)— A new safe glass for eyeglasses was announced today by the American Optical company.

These lenses are sandwich glass the same as auto windshields. The middle of each lens is a sheet of plastic.

Demonstrations were made to show that the new glasses are protection to eyes of children, because they stop the bullets of guns, and arrows and slingshots not break them.

A BB rifle bullet at 35 ft cracked the new lens, but broke ordinary lens into fragments. Fragments flew from the crack in the new lens.



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
