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Biron Soldier Loses Life in Traffic Crash

Injuries received in a Colorado highway accident early Sunday morning proved fatal to Pfc. David F. Prusynski, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Prusynski, Route 1, Wisconsin Rapids. He died in the army hospital at Camp Carson, Colo.

Details of the accident were not given in the telegram received by the parents.

The Biron soldier was one of four servicemen from Camp Carson who were injured fatally in the crash of the soldiers' car against a bridge abutment three miles south of Fountain, Colo.

Military services are being arranged for Pfc. Prusynski. The date of the funeral is being held in abeyance pending receipt of word as to when the remains will arrive here.

Pfc. Prusynski was born at Neenah on February 8, 1932, the family moving to this area shortly thereafter. He attended Lincoln High school and left to enter service on October 25, 1949, training at Camp McCoy and Fort Riley, Kas., prior to being assigned to Camp Carson.

Surviving, in addition to his parents, are four brothers, Robert, Kaukauna; Glenn, Jerry and Dale, at home; and seven sisters, Mrs. Leo Haydock, Rockford, Ill.; Mrs. Fred Pandow, Milwaukee; Mrs. Dana Norman, Wisconsin Rapids; Judy, Mary, Jackie and Aleta, all at home.
