BULLETIN

London—(P)—Mogilev, guarding the approaches to the White Russian capital of Minsk, has been captured by the onrushing Red armies. Marshal Stalin announced tonight in a special order of the day.

Moscow—(P)—Supported by one of the greatest air attacks ever hurled against the Germans, on the Russian front, the Red Army closed in from three directions today on Minsk, the capital of White Russia.

Dispatches from the front said that probably never before had Stormovik dive-bombers been thrown with such strength and effectiveness against Nazi armored forces. Hour after hour they were reported searching out German tanks, plastering them in mass with their flying artillery and blasting the way for four armies converging in a great semicircle on the gateway city to Warsaw and Germany.

The northernmost of the three spearheads aimed at Minsk was composed of Gen. Ivan Bagramian's first Baltic army and 36-year-old Gen. Ivan Cherniakhovsky's third White Russian army. In the van of this group were the Stormoviks, fast Yak fighter planes and medium bombers of Lt. Gen. N. P. Papiyev, Bagramian's 37-year-old air commander, and Col. Gen. Timofey Kruikin, Cherniakhovsky's youthful aviation chief.

River of Milk on Road as Truck Hits

The greater portion of 17 tons of milk was lost at the junction of Highways 54 and 51 in Plover early this morning when a White House milk truck rolled over after bumping into the rear end of a car driven by George Gilman of Plover.

The big truck itself, from Valders, Wis., was only slightly damaged and continued on its way under its own power after being righted. The back of the Gilman car suffered considerable damage.

The accident occurred as both the truck and the car were traveling south on Highway 51 from Stevens Point

river line, and plunged two miles beyond.

Yanks Clear Cherbourg Area

American troops meanwhile battled at the foot of Cap de La Hague, jutting northwest of Cherbourg, where the Nazis were making a last stand. They mopped up in the port, and subdued resistance at Maupertus airfield to the east.

Perhaps 10,000 prisoners have been captured in other sectors of Normandy, bringing to 40,000-50,000 the total allied bag.

Headquarters disclosed that Lt. Gen. Miles C. Dempsey, 47, commander of the veteran 13th corps of the Eighth army in Africa, Sicily, and Italy, was leading the British Second army in France.

The huge tank battle near Caen may decide the fate of a large part of the Germans 15th and 17th armies. The Germans have thrown four armored divisions into this area.
