Parks' sales last year totaled about a half million dollars.

ADM reported 1969 sales of \$12,687,181. Its product line includes aluminum-framed, prehung exterior doors, heating and cooling ducts, metal and plastic extrusions, drapery hardware and other hardware.

Currently 11 persons are employed at the local plant, and Parks said employment is expected to rise to 25 or 30 with the completion of the one-story, steel building addition.

# Nixon, LBJ About White

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon gave Lyndon B. Johnson a tour of the new White House press room today and the former president agreed it is a vast improvement over the crowded old quarters.

"This is a wonderful improvement," Johnson said. "But has there been any improvement in the stories?"

The two men wandered through the whole area, through a briefing room filled with furniture with a Williamsburg, Va., decor, past booths for wire services and network reporters and desks for others.

Nixon recalled that previously photographers had to use a small room dubbed "the dog house," and reporters used a bigger but jammed room which now is being converted into offices for presidential assistant Henry M. Kissinger.

Johnson had a gift for Nixon, a silhouetted picture of the two of them in the White House Red Room, waiting for the ceremonies to start on the day of Nixon's inauguration in January last year—what Johnson called "a changing of the guard."

# Marshfield Soldier Killed in Vietnam

Another Marshfield serviceman has lost his life in Vietnam.

Sgt. William T. Smith, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Smith, 309 S. Maple Ave., was killed in action April 2. He had been in Vietnam about four months.

His parents were notified personally Sunday noon by an Army officer and received a telegram this morning stating that their son was fatally injured while engaged in "combat operation when a hostile force was encountered."

Sgt. Smith was a member of the 27th Infantry Division. A brother, Michael, 19, is presently stationed in Vietnam.

The sergeant, who was born May 6, 1949, in Marshfield, received his education here and graduated in 1968 from Marshfield Senior High School. In August of that year, he entered the Army and received his basic training at Ft. Campbell, Ky.
