

Alfonsi Will Be at Work Next Monday

MADISON (AP) — Assemblyman Paul Alfonsi says he will spend the weekend at home, but plans to check in Monday to the office he has not vacated despite a bribery conviction.

Assembly clerks said Friday that Alfonsi's name was erased from the legislative payroll roster as a result of his conviction on a charge of accepting a bribe in the form of a \$100 check which the Republican argued was simply meant to cover expenses.

He is appealing the conviction. He faces a \$1,000 fine or six months in jail, and could see the end to a 34-year public office career.

His office desk near the chamber where the Assembly minority leader was once Assembly speaker remains piled high with papers.

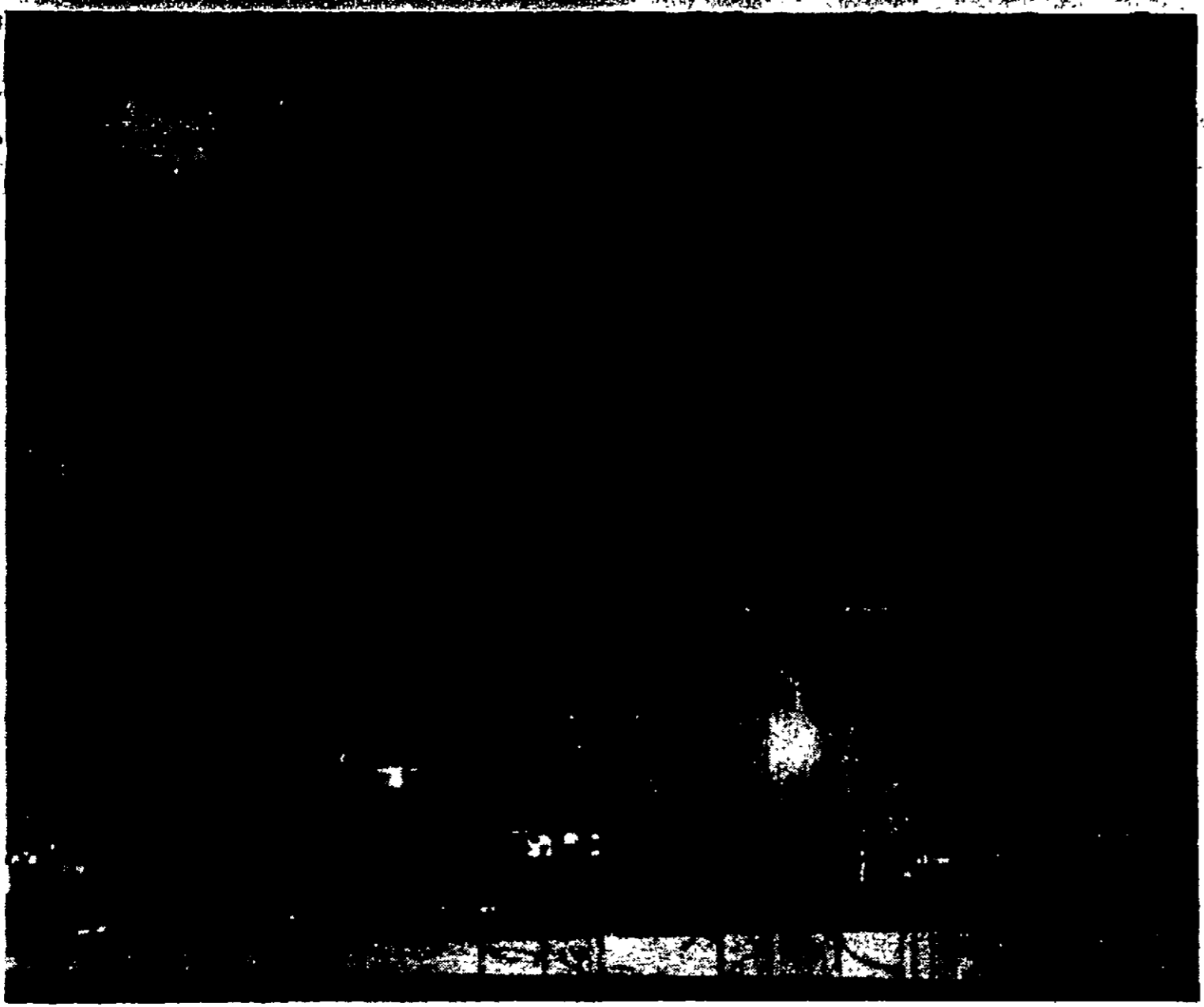
He was at work in the office Friday, and when asked about his schedule next week, he said he would be back Monday.

'Now Hear This!'

Navy May Soon Put Women In Submarines—by Recording

WASHINGTON (AP) — The words of warning automatically Navy may soon send a woman to sea in its submarines — electronically, that is.

The woman's voice — "sultry" is the way the Navy described it — may replace such submarine alarms as blinking red lights, honks, buzzes and squawks.

These signals, far less appealing to the masculine senses, alert a submarine operator to recording designed to sound

sure seawater flooding, fire or serious power failure.

"A real attention-getter is needed for extremely dangerous situations," the Navy said.

Then it said: "In view of the well-established responsiveness of Navy men to the female voice, among other things, the new system is expected to be highly successful."

What will the voice say? "Fire! Fire! There is a fire in the crew's mess." and "Flooding! Flooding! There is serious flooding in the after steering room" were examples supplied by the Navy.

Disclose Girl's Name

The Navy did not explain how a voice can be "sultry" and still manage to impart to the male listener an urgency to carry out his duties.

The Navy did disclose the voice will be that of Joan Ririe, employed by the Nortronics Division of Northrop Corp., Palos Verdes, Calif. developer of the vocal warning system.

She was described as a professional recorder for Nortronics as well as a part-time singer and former actress.

With gentlemanly restrict The prerecorded warning speech will be checked out in the near future aboard an operational sub. Once satisfactorily evaluated, the voice will be installed aboard all of the Navy's 150 operational subs, a spokesman said.

Starlings Invade West Allis Area

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Suburban West Allis has been invaded by a flock of starlings, and city officials have spent a week considering means of chasing the pests away.

John Cahill, superintendent of public grounds, said his crewmen have tried trimming branches from trees to discourage the birds from roosting, and have discovered a temporary cure which may be as noisy as the starlings.

"We found," he said, "that you can drive many of them away by dragging a snow shovel on the sidewalk and dropping it ever so often."

Inmate Files \$8,000 Suit In Milwaukee

MILWAUKEE (AP) — An inmate at the state penitentiary in Waupun has filed suit demanding \$8,000 he says he is owed him by the Milwaukee County sheriff's department for his help in designing a color guard emblem.

A civil summons was served Friday on a department captain in the absence of Sheriff Michael S. Wolke concerning a claim by John A. Seybold, formerly of Illinois.

Seybold, 41, was sentenced in May 1964 on armed robbery and attempted murder charges concerning a 1963 holdup and gunfight in suburban Wauwatosa.

Seybold, an amateur poet and artist who did sketches of the courtroom during his trial, says in a claim filed with Corner Ronald Witkowski that he designed the emblem while in jail in Milwaukee.

Roger W. Christ, an associate warden at Waupun, said Seybold prepared the suit without the aid of an attorney, and would have to have a judge's written release if he wanted to press the suit in court himself.

Seybold, one of six persons charged in the holdup, has "no much other legal action going it would take six lawyers to handle

it all," Christ said. The other action, Christ said, includes appeals to the state and U.S. Supreme Courts.

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
