Dr. Swan Will Speak at Local Church Sunday

At a special union Reformation Sunday service Sunday evening, the Rev. Alfred W. Swan of Madison will preach on "The Protestant Program."

The service, sponsored by the Wisconsin Rapids Ministerial association, will be held in the Congregational church, starting at 7:45. Dr. Swan, minister of First Congregational church of Madison, is a member of the Committee for Religious Liberty which is affiliated with the Wisconsin Council of Churches.

At the November 5 election, Wisconsin voters will decide for or against a proposed amendment to the state constitution which would authorize public provision for transportation of children to and from parochial and private schools.

Dr. Swan, in the course of his sermon, will discuss some of the reasons for opposing passage of the proposed amendment. The service is open to all.

Ripon College To Honor Dead

Among those who will be honored at Ripon college in an outdoor service planned in memory of the 57 former students and graduates who gave their lives in World War II is Sgt. John N. Simon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl F. Simon, 741 Devey street, who was killed in action December 17, 1944, in Luxembourg.

The service which is being planned by the "R" club, will be held at 10 o'clock Sunday morning on the terrace of the Frank J. Harwood Memorial union. This will terminate the first Ripon college homecoming held since 1942.

Dr. Clark G. Kuebler, president of the college, will open the ceremony and the college choir will sing an anthem under the direction of William Peterman, college music instructor. After the benediction and the singing of the Alma Mater, taps will conclude the service.

Former St. Lawrence Pastor Now at Plover The Rev. Stephen Mieczkowski, former pastor of St. Lawrence Catholic church for 14 years, officially was to take over the pastorate of St. Bronislawa Catholic church at Plover Thursday.

The Rev. Fr. Mieczkowski, who left Wisconsin Rapids in June 1943, has been in the armed forces serving as chaplain aboard a hospital ship. He has been active in that murderous incident but had simply kept the garments of those who stoned Stephen to death.

The picture of that good man, praying for the forgiveness of his murderers and calling upon the Lord Jesus to receive his spirit, was one that must have left an impression on Paul that he could not erase.

The first effect would be to make him more intense in his persecution, kicking against the pricks of conscience and trying to stifle his doubts by becoming all the more furious in his hostility toward the Christians. But when he was arrested on the Damascus road, saw the vision, and heard the voice, he knew what it all meant.

Experience Not Unique This was the sudden moment when light burst upon his soul. But there had been a long preparation for it in his religious upbringing, as well as an immediate preparation in the doubts which arose as he saw the calm heroism and the manifest faith of those whom he was persecuting.

The word "Jesus" had a new meaning for Paul as he heard the voice say: "I am Jesus, whom thou persecutest."

Lutherans Oppose Bus Referendum

Milwaukee—(AP)—The Wisconsin Council of Churches released statements yesterday from a number of Lutheran leaders who oppose the parochial school bus amendment in the November 5 referendum. Ellis H. Dana, the council's executive vice president, said "most Lutheran leaders and groups," were united in opposition to the amendment which would permit the state to furnish transportation of children to and from private and parochial schools.

The council said that "moral and financial support" of its campaign against the amendment had been "voted officially" by the National Lutheran Council Pastoral conference of the Madison area, Lutheran Pastors of the American Lutheran Conference of the Northwestern Wisconsin, and the Lutheran Brotherhoods of the Wisconsin District of the American Lutheran church.

Work of American Missionary Group Described in Talk Devoting his talk primarily to the American Missionary association, which is celebrating its hundredth anniversary, John F. Potts, director of Avey Institute, Charleston, S. C., explained the functions and history of that organization to a gathering at the First Congregational church Thursday night.

The objectives of the AMA, Potts pointed out, are three: First, the emancipation of enslaved peoples everywhere; second, the education of minority groups who would otherwise remain illiterate; and third, the integration of all peoples, regardless of race or creed, into a unified society.

He concluded his talk by urging the help and guidance of everyone "in making this a better world in which to live... for all mankind." Earlier in the day, the Negro educator had spoken before assemblies at Lincoln High school and at John Edwards High school in Port Edwards.

Rites for Rev. Likes Sunday

Hancock—Funeral services for the Rev. H. P. Likes, 70, who died Wednesday afternoon at his home in Hancock, will be held at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon at the Hancock Community church with the Rev. George R. Graves, Oshkosh, officiating. Burial will be in Hancock cemetery.

He was born May 22, 1876, at Fenton, Ill., and married Louisa Pinkley there October 16, 1900. He resided in central Wisconsin since 1909.

The late Rev. Mr. Likes served in the first World War as a Y. M. C. A. chaplain. He was ordained as an evangelist and spent a number of years in graduate work with Holland Oates in Chicago. Since 1932 until recently he was pastor of Potter Memorial church in the town of Deerfield.

Survivors are his wife, a daughter, Mrs. C. C. Robinson, Vesper, and two sons, DeVeere, North Ridge, Cal., and Kirkwood, Wauwatosa; two stepdaughters, Gladys McManners, Black River Falls, and Mrs. J. M. Huck, Hastings, Neb.; one sister, Mrs. W. H. Nuld, Morrison, Ill.; 10 grandchildren, and three great grandchildren.
