Check Your Sleep Habits For---Beauty

BY ALICIA HART Sleep is so essential to beauty that every charm-conscious woman should check her slumber habits once in a while. This is particularly true now in wartime, when everyone must get her health and beauty habits down to bedrock considerations.

If you are just an occasional bad-sleeper, you needn't worry too much about it. Occasional sleeplessness in a normal individual is probably due to some unusual excitement or to a passing disorder, says Dr. Jerome W. Ephraim in his practical book, "Take Care of Yourself." But there is one important thing to remember, the habitual bad-sleeper must acquire new habits. Sleep is a habit and, like all habits, can be cultivated and promoted by constant repetition of a good routine.

TRY THESE SLEEPING AIDS

- 1. A regular hour for going to bed. What you need is drowsiness, not tiredness, and drowsiness recurs nightly in persons who keep a regular routine.
2. Have a soothing bedroom. The colors in it should be non-distracting ones like blue or blue-green, light and noise should be shut out as much as possible, bright objects like mirrors can be turned to the wall, beds should be comfortable but not too soft.
3. Learn to relax at bedtime. Simple relaxing exercises promote this. Lying in bed and stretching arms, legs, torso, for instance. A warm bath may be useful. A little food, preferably liquid, fits into a conditioning scheme.
These measures will not cure extreme cases of insomnia. For those, the answer is professional care, because those are tied in with real psychological ailments which definitely can be cured, but only by a specialist. However, it would be worthwhile for any repeatedly sleepless person to try first, and conscientiously, this self-treatment routine.
