Monsoon Season Precludes Major Invasion of Burma Before Next Fall

DANDELIONS MAY PRODUCE RUBBER

Madison, Wis.—(AP)—Rubber-producing Russian dandelion, the seed of which was brought to this country from the Soviet union in a bombing plane last spring, can be grown successfully on Wisconsin farms, the Wisconsin college of agriculture announced today.
 Report Good Results
 Trial plantings made by Alvin Schwendiman and L. F. Graber on the college's experimental farms near here in 1942 produced an average of 4,600 pounds of fresh root to the acre despite the fact that the seeds were planted about two months late. E. J. Delwiche also reported good results from a test planting at the Sturgeon Bay experiment station.
 The seed was furnished by the United States department of agriculture which has under consideration a dandelion-growing program that would be large enough to be a factor in relieving the nation's rubber shortage.
 The Wisconsin crop, together with small amounts grown in other parts of the country, are being processed under supervision of federal officials to determine the yield and quality of rubber obtainable from the plant roots.
 Schwendiman and Graber commented: "Although it seems clear that the Russian dandelion can be grown in Wisconsin, that does not necessarily mean it will be profitable to do so. Probably the price of dandelion rubber would have to be several times the former price of East Indian rubber in order to make the crop pay, since it requires a good deal of slow hand work."

Brings Quick Results

An outstanding advantage of dandelion roots as a rubber crop, they added, is that it brings quick results, providing rubber the first year. Guayule, proposed as a rubber crop for the southwest, requires four or five years to reach a marketable stage and tropical rubber trees demand 10 years or more.

The Chinese, who long had been looking forward eagerly to an allied invasion early this year to oust the Japs from Burma and reopen this backdoor for vital supplies, are bound to be bitterly disappointed as the monsoon season draws near and precludes such a major operation before next fall.

British Readjust Lines
 Approach of this deluge of rain is signaled in dispatches indicating that the British are signing-off their attempt to drive the Nipponese from the Mayu peninsula, in the Akyab sector of the Burmese coast, and are readjusting their lines in preparation for the mud and flood. The downpour will arrive within the next few weeks and will last until October.

Actually I believe that much more than the Monsoon stands in the way of a big-scale invasion of Burma. This will involve a great waterborne expedition from India, across the Bay of Bengal, and there's no indication that the united nations have the equipment to spare at this critical juncture.

Hitler Comes First
 Certainly one would think that the North African campaign would have to be concluded first, in order to release equipment and reopen the Mediterranean route to India. Indeed, he would be a bold prophet who suggested that a full-dress Burmese invasion could be attempted before Herr Hitler himself had been smashed—or at least rendered pretty well impotent.

Information on Rationing

IMPORTANT DATES
 March 29—Rationing begins for PORK, BEEF, LAMB, VEAL, CANNED FISH, BUTTER and other edible fats and oils, and most kinds of CHEESE, using red stamps in Ration Book 2 for a maximum of 16 points a week. Red "A" stamps become valid. Fresh fish, game, poultry, and soap not to be rationed.

March 29—Start of 12 day period for INSTITUTIONAL and INDUSTRIAL USERS to get point allotments from local war price and rationing boards for meats, fats and oils, canned fish and cheese.

March 31—TIRE INSPECTION must be completed by holders of "A" gasoline ration books by close of March. Tires to be inspected every six months thereafter.

March 31—Blue "A", "B", and "C" stamps in Ration Book 2 expire at the close of March for purchase of CANNED, BOTTLED, DRIED, and FROZEN foods.

April 1—RETAILERS begin registration for processed foods with local war price and rationing boards; WHOLESALERS begin registration by mail with the OPA at Washington.

April 4—Red "B" stamps in Ration Book 2 become valid for purchase of MEATS, FATS and OILS, CANNED FISH, and CHEESE by consumers.

April 10—RETAILERS and WHOLESALERS end registration for processed foods.

April 11—Red "C" stamps in Ration Book 2 become valid for purchase of MEATS, FATS and OILS, CANNED FISH, and CHEESE by consumers.

April 11—RETAILERS, WHOLESALERS, and PRIMARY DISTRIBUTORS, including PROCESSORS, begin surrendering points for purchase of MEATS, FATS and OILS, CANNED FISH and CHEESE.

April 17—FUEL OIL coupon No. 4 expires.

April 18—Red "D" stamps in Ration Book 2 become valid for purchase of MEATS, FATS and OILS, CANNED FISH, and CHEESE by consumers.

April 25—WHOLESALE and RETAILERS' allowable inventories of meats, fats, and oils, canned fish, and cheese to be based on sales, in points, during this week.

April 25—"COFFEE stamp" No. 26 expires at midnight.

April 30—Red "A", "B", "C", and "D" stamps in War Ration Book 2 expire at midnight.

April 30—On or after this date, PRIMARY DISTRIBUTORS, including PROCESSORS, make compliance report for first reporting period, covering operations from March 29.

May 1—RETAILERS and WHOLESALERS take point inventory of meats, fats and oils, canned fish, and cheese at close of business on this date.
 May 1—RETAILERS and WHOLESALERS begin registering with local boards and receive allowable point inventories for meats, fats and oils, canned fish, and cheese.
 May 14—RETAILERS and WHOLESALERS end registration.
 May 21—No. 5 stamp in "A" GASOLINE book expires.
 May 31—"SUGAR stamp" No. 12 expires at midnight.

LULL IN PACIFIC MAY BE PRELUDE TO NEW BLOWS

Washington—(AP)—The current lull in Pacific fighting, broken only by air attacks against Japanese outposts in the Solomon and Aleutian islands, was regarded in informed quarters today as indicating that American commanders have been strengthening and disposing their forces for powerful new blows against the enemy.

Two-Fold Plan

The objectives of these offensives, qualified informants predicted, will be both to win new strategic positions for United States forces and further to reduce Japan's waning sea power before the enemy has an opportunity to recover from past losses.

Every day that passes without significant action, it was emphasized, gives the enemy more time to repair damaged ships, speed new ones to completion, strengthen the bases that guard his far flung empire and develop the rich conquests of the south Pacific.

Since shipping is known to be one of the enemy's most vulnerable points, an initial move might be designed to compel him to fight under terms favorable to American success. In seeking to maintain their hold on Guadalcanal, the Japanese spent ships and planes desperately even after it became apparent they must eventually lose the island.

May Invade Munda Area

Another island conquest which would cause them similarly serious losses would be a highly profitable enterprise for the United States even though the territory actually won might not be of major strategic importance.
 To launch such an enterprise it was believed here that the navy might strike more deeply into the Solomons archipelago by invading either the Munda area immediately beyond Guadalcanal or attacking Bougainville, the big island at the northwestern end of the chain.
 Strategy aimed primarily at the conquest of an important position might—depending on the forces available—call for an attack on Truk, the enemy's main naval base in the south Pacific or on the Marshall islands east of Truk and the Carolines where the Japanese have built up an interlocking chain of strong outposts remotely flanking the communications lines between Hawaii and the south Pacific.

Japs Hold Wake

North of the Carolines another possible target is Wake, where the enemy has already been bombed several times.
 The navy has not been in important combat since the first days of February and inquiries here as to the reasons for this apparent inactivity produced the suggestion that it could only mean that preparations were in progress for new strokes.

730,618 'A' Gasoline Ration Books Issued in Wisconsin

Milwaukee—(AP)—Don T. Allen, area director of the office of price administration, announced today that Wisconsin motorists obtained 730,618 "A" gasoline ration books during the first registration period in November and December, 1942. Allen said that 147,961 "B" books and 57,744 "C" books for supplemental rations were issued during the same period.

The OPA director said Wisconsin ranked second highest among the seven midwestern states in region six in the number of "A" and "C" books issued and third highest in number of "B" cards. He said 20.3 per cent of "A" book holders also had "B" books and that 7.9 per cent of the "A" card holders had "C" books as well.
 Other states in the region include Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, North and South Dakota and Minnesota. Illinois led in the total of all three books and Iowa was ahead of Wisconsin among "B" book holders.
 Allen said the total of all gasoline books issued, when compared with total population, ranked Wisconsin third in the region.
 He said books issued in Wisconsin totaled 31.2 for every 100 persons. Nebraska, with 33.9, and Iowa, with 31.9, ranked ahead. The average for the seven states was 29.6, he said.
 At Green Bay Edward J. Konkol, district manager of the office of defense transportation, announced that 5,619 appeals for additional gasoline rations for commercial vehicles had been filed.
 Konkol said the number was 14 per cent of the 40,000 trucks operating under certificates of war neces-

New Point Values to Be Announced Sunday

Washington—(AP)—Sunday morning newspapers will tell American housewives of new point values for processed fruits and vegetables, and the best guess is that coupon costs will be substantially lower.
 OPA officials declined to cite specific figures but indicated numerous reductions, and a few increases, could be expected when the new table is made public.
 Various kinds of cans, bottles and packages, especially of fruits and larger sizes of other products, apparently are due for reduced point values. Increases will be applied to items that are selling faster than they can be replaced on store shelves.
