## FALLING BIRTH RATE TROUBLES BRITAIN


London—(AP)—Possibility that Britain may have a population of only 27,000,000 in 2063, against today's 47,000,000, is among suppositions expected to be raised in connection with the debate on the Beveridge plan.

These estimates are made by some experts on the basis of current trends in the birth and these men regard the falling birth rate as one of the major problems that must be realistically dealt with if the Beveridge or any other long-term social security plan is to have any genuine success.
