Missing, Listed as Dead

S/Sgt. Phillip Davis, missing in action in Belgium since February 2, 1945, is considered to be dead, according to a war department telegram received earlier this week by the soldier's father, Ray L. Davis, Route 4, Wisconsin Rapids.

Sergeant Davis was born in Wood county and resided in this area until he enlisted in the air corps in September, 1942. He entered service at Fort Sheridan II, then was contact the service of the servic at Fort Sheridan, Il., then was sent to Camp Livingston, La., for basic army training, His next station was Camp Pickett, Va., after which he was transferred to the air corps and sent to Southwestern college, Mem-

phis, Tenn.
Five months later, he was transferred to Camp Gordon Johnston, Fla., and then to San Antonio, Tex. Next, he was transferred back to the army at Camp Livingston, La., sent to Fort George Meade, Md., and shipped overseas in September, 1944. He was serving with the First army in Belgium, when he was reported missing.

In addition to his father, Sergeant Davis is survived by three brothers, George, who received his honorable discharge from the air corps Mon-day, Richard and Clifford, at home, and a sister, Mrs. George Pelot, who also resides on Route 4.
