AWAIT SIGNATURE OF FDR AS SPUR TO NEW EFFORT

Washington-(.P)- Awaiting word that President Roosevelt had signed the \$7,-000,000,000 British aid appropriation at sea, the capital found today that the cost of the enormous national defense program had almost reached the \$40,000,000,000 mark.

Actually, an OPM tabulation showed, the authorized and proposed United States expenditures since June 1, 1940, have totaled \$39,177,800,000, including the British aid appropriation. An additional \$3,511.000.000 in orders have been placed here by Great Britain in that period.

Signal for New Effort

The president's signature on the huge aid appropriation measure was generally expected to be a signal for a new intensification of effort to get those dollars transformed into the necessary supplies as rapidly as possible, and to get those supplies delivered to Britain and American armed forces.

Same saw a hint of a stepped-up aid tempo when defense officials late yesterday ordered 200 tons of magnesium-an ingredient in incendiary bombs-ready for Great Britain by April 1.

Other Consignments Secret

This was the first lease-lend consignment whose character was officially disclosed. Authorities have made known that other shipments of supplies were either on their way or being prepared, but details were withheld on the ground that military information was involved.

Defense officials already have done considerable advance work in preparing to handle the new flood of orders that the \$7,000.000.000 aid appropriation will loose, and to integrate them, as far as possible, with army and navy purchasing pro-

Congress, meanwhile, kept workng away today on national defense appropriation requests on which legislative action has yet to be com-

Asks More Army Funds

The senate appropriations subcommittee, which has been considering a joint army-navy \$4,073,813,-074 supplemental appropriation, received President Roosevelt's request for an immediate \$312,871,000 increase in army funds to be spent largely on new military posts and the expanding air corps.

Appearing before the subcommitlee yesterday, General George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, was reported to have urged the approplane pilot training program from its current goal of 12,000 new pilots a year to 30,000.

Urges Forest Works Authority for State

Madison, Wis. -(P) A forest works authority which would supervise the use of tax delinquent land in northern Wisconsin for forestry purposes was proposed to the legislature today by Assemblyman Henry J. Berquist (Prog), Rhinelander.

Berquist introduced a bill appropriating \$1,000,000 annually to the proposed agency, which would be headed by a director appointed by the governor for a six-year term.
