Missionary to Tell Tri-City Women About Life in China

Living in "occupied China" in these days is a precarious yet highly rewarding experience and Mrs. Rowland M. Cross, Congregational missionary under the American Board of Foreign Missions in Tungsien, tells of her experiences when she speaks at the Congregational Women's association meeting on Wednesday, January 21, at 2:30 p. m. The meeting will follow a 1 o'clock luncheon.

An invitation has been extended to the women of all churches in the Tri-City area to hear Mrs. Cross, and to attend the luncheon as well. Reservations for the luncheon must be made by Monday morning. Mrs. Cross, born Adelle Tenney, in Winona, Minn., was educated at Wooster university conservatory of music and took special training in kindergarten work. She first went to China in 1915 to do kindergarten teaching. There four years later she met and married the Rev. Mr. Cross, a fellow missionary.

Following her marriage Mrs. Cross continued teaching where most needed and more recently has put her musical talent and training to good use in choral direction at Goodrich girls' school, Jefferson academy for boys and the North China school for foreign children, all at Tungsien.

She not only has her own background of experience to draw from—life in peaceful, progressive China, and life in war-torn, occupied China—but her husband has traveled extensively in his position as secretary of the North China committee on co-ordination of emergency relief, meeting terrific refugee relief problems. Mrs. Cross utilizes this vital and first-hand material in telling of the spirit and purpose of the Chinese Church of Christ today.
