Rapid City S. D. (AP)—Ten men and officers aboard a four-motored army bomber from the Rapid City air base were killed when the plane crashed Sunday night near Ordway, Colo., the public relations office at the base here announced today.
Names of the casualties will be withheld until positive identification has been completed, the public relations officer said.

ARMY SOUGHT FOR FARMERS

Wickard and McNutt Seek to Mobilize 'Land Army' of 3,500,000

WOULD PAY WORKERS

Washington (AP)—War Manpower Commissioner Paul V. McNutt and Food Administrator Wickard announced today they would seek to mobilize a "land army" of about 3,500,000 to volunteer for seasonal farm work this year.
Together they told a press conference that persons doing work not connected directly with the war effort would be enrolled in both rural and urban communities and asked to shift temporarily to planting and harvesting work whenever needed to save crops.
