

## Family copes with soldier's death

ARPIN — Family and friends of Army Pfc. Kevin Lee Calloway are still trying to cope with his death that occurred Saturday in Saudi Arabia. He was the first soldier from Wisconsin — and the 49th from the United States — to die in duties affiliated with Operation Desert Shield. His parents, Leonard and Judy Calloway of rural Arpin, said they learned around noon Sunday of his death in a truck collision. "It's a real shocker," said

*Kevin's parents said he entered military service for training, and had planned to use money he was saving to attend college at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, where he wanted to study computers.*

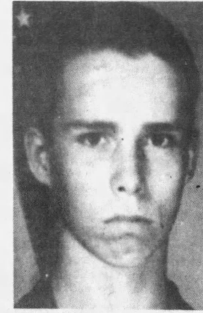
Judy. "He didn't like it (serving in the Middle East). He was scared. "I told him, 'I'm going to worry about you until the day you come home.'" she said today.

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Kevin graduated from Auburndale High School in 1988. Former teacher Phil Wettstein said that Kevin was technically oriented.

"He liked to work with his hands," he said. "He liked working with computers because he could get an immediate response." Wettstein taught Kevin in computer classes for two years, and said he consulted with him on a few occasions about the military service.
