14 die over weekend in state traffic

A Dane County fatality today and 13 weekend deaths, including double fatalities in Monroe and Shawano counties, raised the state's 1969 highway toll to 823 compared with 877 on this date last year.

Larry D. Ruegsegger, 21, of Dane, was killed early today when his car hit the cement base of a traffic signal in the Dane County village.

Shawano County authorities reported today the death of two persons in an accident Saturday. George L. Erdman, 20, Pulaski, and Cathy Reimert, 17, Shawano, died when a car left Highway 29, south of Bonduel, and overturned.

Walter Burke Jr., 21, of Black River Falls and Raymond Giesler, 60, of Sparta were fatally injured late Sunday when their cars collided head-on north of Sparta. A Tomah woman in Giesler's car was hospitalized.

Funeral services were held this afternoon at the Fort Lewis, Wash., Army Chapel for SFC Ronald James Hagen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Hagen, Nekooosa, who was killed in action in Vietnam Sept. 17.

The requiem mass was conducted by Capt. Duaine C. Circk, Catholic chaplain, and interment followed in Mountain View Cemetery, Tacoma, Wash., with full military honors.

Sgt. Hagen, 39, enlisted in the Army Sept. 9, 1948, and served in the Korean conflict as one of the original members of the 10th Special Forces. An honor graduate of the Noncommissioned Officers Academy at Fort Lewis in 1961, he was assigned to duty at Fort Bragg, N. C., that same year.

His overseas service included tours of duty in Ethiopia, Thailand and Vietnam. He also completed a course in jungle warfare conducted in India, and was an instructor at the John F. Kennedy Center for Special Warfare at Fort Bragg prior to returning to Vietnam last January.

He was born March 5, 1930, in Milwaukee and graduated from Marquette High School there on June 6, 1948.

Surviving Sgt. Hagen, in addition to his parents, are his wife, Roberta, Lacey, Wash.; two sons, Ronald James II and Raymond John, and two daughters, Rhonda Jean and Noralee.
