NEW YORK (AP) — Government agents operated a trading company for four or five months to help gather evidence against 20 men accused of stealing a half-million dollars worth of merchandise from port of New York piers, U.S. Atty. Robert M. Morgenthau said today.

Warrants for the men were issued late Friday. Early today 17 had been taken into custody. Federal authorities, New York City police, New Jersey state troopers and investigators of the Bi-State Waterfront Commission participated in the wholesale roundup.

Single Conspiracy
Morgenthau, who will prosecute the case, said the men were charged with a single conspiracy to remove goods from U.S. Customs custody and control.

He said it was part of the conspiracy to deliver goods and receive payment for them at the A.R. Trading Co., 44 Eldridge St., Manhattan. This was the trading company, he said, that government agents operated.

Morgenthau acknowledged that the government set up the A.R. Trading Co. Among the things taken were Belgian linens, transistor radios, Japanese fabrics, German camera-

Iraq (Continued from Page 1) imprisoned by him for a reported assassination attempt. Col. Ahmed Hassan Bakr, was named to head the cabinet as prime minister. Bakr had been discharged from the army by Kassem for suspected participation in a revolt against him in 1959.

The six-man junta headed by Col. Abdel Kerim Mustafa took for itself the powers of commander-in-chief of the armed forces, a position that was held by Kassem and normally would have gone to the new president. The move suggested that Aref might be a figurehead.

In Cairo, President Nasser hailed the revolt as a victory for the "Arab struggle." The United Arab Republic and its Yemen satellite quickly recognized the new regime, and Nasserites obviously viewed the coup as a boost for their dream of Middle East supremacy.

Kassem, a 48-year-old bachelor, lived in the ministry surrounded by a security guard. Reputedly, he slept only three or four hours a night and took that rest on hard soldier's cot with a bodyguard always near.

Algeria also announced that it recognized the new regime. So did Kuwait, the neighboring oil rich kingdom which Kassem had claimed. Obviously Kuwait hoped the claim would now be forgotten.

Large elements of the army sorely needed to support the revolt in Baghdad and elsewhere, apparently were still tied down in mountainous northern Iraq facing the Kurdish guerrillas. Although the Kurds themselves could never have unseated Kassem, his feeble efforts to overcome them undoubtedly played a role in spreading dissatisfaction in the army.
