## MASS TO BE READ FOR SGT. REDMOND

Pittsville Soldier Dies of Wounds Suffered in · Africa Campaign

Pittsville-(Special)-A Memorial Requiem High Mass will be read Tuesday morning at 7:30 o'clock at St. Joachim's Catholic Church, Pittsville, of which the Rev. John Willitzer is pastor, for Sgt. Thomas A. Redmond, 26, who died in action in North Africa.

Sgt. Redmond, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Redmond, who reside on a farm 4 miles north of Pittsville, was seriously wounded in action on May 14, after having been overseas since last October.

He was born in Rockford, Ill., Jan. 6, 1917, and when two years old went with his parents to Necedah, moving to the Pittsville vicinity seven years later. Since that time and up to the time of entering service Feb. 19, 1941, he lived in and near Pittsville, where he graduated from St. Joachim's Parochial School.

Surviving besides his parents are seven brothers, William of Minneapolis, John of Rockford, Ill., and Gerald, James, Robert, Everett, and Charles, all at home, and two sisters, Mrs. Merlin (Dorothy) Schooley, Seneca Corners, and Mrs. Edward (Mary) Weinfurter, Florida, where she is living with Florida, where she is living with her husband stationed at an Army camp.
