MICHIGAN RESIDENTS RUN INTO DIVIDEND TROUBLE

Detroit (AP)—Michigan stockholders of the Tom Moore Distillery Co. face difficulties before they may gain possession of the 27 gallons of whisky per share the company plans to distribute as a dividend on Dec. 21.

A temporary injunction restraining the company from distributing the liquor divide dissolved in Circuit Court Monday.

Alfred W. Lindbloom, Detroit counsel for the company, said the dividend would be in the form of negotiable certificates. A \$6 a gallon Federal tax would apply at the warehouse, but before any of the whisky may be distributed in Michigan approval must be obtained from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

Ensign Mittelsteadt is married and his wife lives in La Crosse.

from Councilmen before they were referred to the Finance Committee were suggestions for salary increases for a police officer and fireman.

The Commission under date of Nov. 30, voted to pay Gust Sadowska, extra officer, \$150 per month beginning Jan. 1, and Andrew Gehl, who has now completed his probationary period, \$150 per month as a regular fireman. Sadowska is now paid at the rate of 30 per day and Gehl \$135 per month.

Alderman J. J. Coates said that proposed salaries were "entirely out of line" and that members of the department with years of service were not receiving that amount. Alderman A. J. Reetz also referred to the fact that a salary scale based on years of service is in effect.

Starting salary in the Police Department, officials said following the meeting, is \$118, plus a \$25 raise over a period of five years to the present top of \$140. In the Fire Department, veteran drivers are paid \$140 per month, while new drivers, who is also a mechanic, receives \$150.

The Council approved a Water and Light Commission action authorizing Supt. Ed Klipp to advertise for bids for the drilling of a new well to replace one which collapsed about three weeks ago. The damaged well is one known as No. 5 and located southeast of Park utility's plant at Wildwood Park. In operation for 20 years, the well ended its usefulness when the well screen collapsed, causing it to fill up with gravel.

Numerous recommendations concerning the purchase of structural steel, reinforcement, lumber, sand and gravel for the city garage construction project were approved by the aldermen.

Other Actions

The Council also approved the report of the city treasurer showing a balance on hand as of Dec. 1 amounting to \$129,500.89; the street commissioner's payroll expense for November amounting to \$7,629.61 including snow and ice removal expenses listed at \$94.88, and the report of the sewage treatment plant operator, which listed expenses totaling \$1,173.87.

Heard and approved the report by J. P. Murphy, city recreation director, which showed the recreation program had accommodated 1,808 persons last month, at an average cost of 12 1/2 cents per participant. The attendance estimates did not include 66 members of the Knit Hole Club, a dancing club operating Friday and Saturday evenings by a group of young people who pay a small membership fee, elect their own officers and conduct their activity under
