Gunzel Pleads Not Guilty to County Charge

Waupaca—(P)—Ralph Gunzel, former sheriff of Marathon County, entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned Saturday before Circuit Judge H. J. Severson on an information containing 72 counts. They charged malfeasance in office, obtaining money under false pretenses and misdemeanors over 36 months.

Judge Severson denied two motions by Gunzel's attorney, who sought to enter a plea in abatement and moving the information be quashed, and that a continuance be granted so that he could prepare the defense.

Gunzel made his plea after the motions were denied and Judge Severson ordered the trial conducted in Stevens Point.

Marvin King, Wisconsin Rapids, is special prosecutor of the case, which was transferred here from Portage on a change of venue.

Several members of Congress, including Representative Smith (R-Wis) and Representative Andresen (R-Minn) disagreed.

"I would doubt that there will be an increase in the number of milk cows," asserted Andresen. "My observations are that the people, who cannot get the manpower to handle the herds, are selling off the cows for slaughter and selling
