Arthur Haertel, engineer, and E. D. Smiley, fireman, both of Stevens Point, were uninjured when they jumped to safety at 12:35 o'clock this noon when the newly-laid Soo main line slid over the edge of the new roadbed and sent their locomotive over on its side beside the new fill, a drop of about 5 or 6 feet.

The spectacular mishap occurred near the east city limits line at the far end of E. Fourth street.

R. F. Darling, Soo Line agent here, said that a wrecker was expected to arrive from Stevens Point early this afternoon to begin the task of putting the huge L-1 (Mike) type locomotive back on the track.

A plow behind the locomotive was also derailed but only partly tipped over in the accident, while seven gravel cars making up the train remained on the tracks, which were shifted for a distance of approximately 200 yards.

Engineer Haertel said that they had hauled the trainload of gravel from the Coolidge pit, near Park Falls and were applying the material to the new section of track when the accident occurred. The cars were being backed into the line.

The accident took place on the Soo Line's construction project here which will include the new main line and switchyard.

## NEW LISTING ARE MAILED BY BOARD

### Selective Service Explains Physical Disqualification Ratings

In accordance with current Selective Service regulations, the North Wood County Selective Service Board has mailed out about 300 cards indicating a II-A (F) or II-B(F) classification. Approximately 200 such classifications were put in the mail yesterday.

Explaining the classifications, the Board said that men who are physically disqualified for military service and are now engaged in an occupation which is a direct contribution to the war program are listed as II-B (F).

Men who are physically disqualified for military service and are engaged in an occupation essential to civilian requirements or support of the war effort are classified II-A (F).

Physically disqualified registrants who are in non-essential work are classified IV-F until such time as they change their occupation, the Board added.

The map, which provides Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and his command details on the potential battlefields, shows defense installations in camouflaged concrete clusters in staggered lines back from the mined European coast.

**Try To Hide View**  
The defense clusters all hide big guns. From some protrude long barrels of huge sunken batteries. From others rocket guns are set to fire toward the channel.

Relying heavily upon camouflage, the Germans have placed virtually all the defense system underground and have used canvas extensively in an attempt to keep completed installations away from the prying eyes of Allied airmen. But the photographic eyes of Allied Air Forces have kept track of the digging step by step.

**No Arms Carried**  
While bombers and other Allied aircraft drummed these installations as high priority targets in weeks of night and day attacks, other reconnaissance planes, each equipped with three to six cameras capable of shooting 180 pictures apiece, have been uncovering the secrets of the west wall.

The planes of the photographic units carry no guns—much to the regret of virtually all the pilots, for they often must swoop close to the enemy. As one said:

"I'd like to do some shooting. We all would. But we realize the importance of getting pictures."

### HENRY FORD SORRY HIS PREDICTION NOT TRUE

**Detroit—(AP)—**Henry Ford, who said in a copyrighted interview with the Atlanta Constitution on March 19 that he believed the war would be over in two months, said today:

"I had information at that time that led me to believe the war would or could be over within two months. I am sorry, as a lot of other people must be, that it is not over."

He made no further comment.

### 2 PLANES ARE FORCED DOWN NEAR MT. HOREB

## Burial of Rapids Flier at Sea Revealed in Dispatch

### Services Conducted Aboard Ship; Flag Will be Sent To Father

Aboard Carrier Flagship, Central Pacific—(AP)—Folks like Mrs. Mary Mabel Arbaugh of Akron, O., and George Leonard Schuetz of Wisconsin Rapids, Wis., doubtless already know that their sons die bravely, when hot shrapnel from Japanese guns flies fatally close. They might like to know, too, how their sons are buried.

Your boy, Mrs. Arbaugh—Carl Vincent Heighton Jr.—and Wallace James Schuetz, Wisconsin Rapids, were rear seat men in carrier planes. Both were fatally

wounded over Truk.

All the loudspeakers on this big ship announced the time of their services and almost all work ceased. It was like a town of several thousand people closing all the stores and offices for the mayor's funeral.

The boys' shipmates crowded, as closely as they could stand, into the big cleared space along the rail.

Protestant services were held for Carl Vincent, and Catholic services for Mr. Schuetz' boy.

**Read 23rd Psalm**  
Big American flags were draped over the bodies as they lay in the center of the cleared space. The Protestant chaplain read the 23rd Psalm and part of revelations 14:13:

"Blessed are the dead which die

In the central sector, French forces captured Esperia, an outpost of the Hitler line and farther south other units of Gen. The advances put the French in position to stab at Monticello, two and a half miles northwest of Esperia in the heart of the area where the Hitler line defenses guard the edge of the Liri Valley.

New York — (AP) — Four-year-old Irene Richie and her twin brother, Richard, were inseparable, sharing everything, always looking out for each other.

Yesterday they started playing together on a grassy plot near the East River. Grownups told them to be careful. But, the twins apparently were so engrossed in each other they paid no heed.

Suddenly, other children shouted. Irene, they said, had toppled into the water, been swept away in the riptide. Richard had jumped in after her. They were last seen together.

The missing children are one of four sets of twins born to Mr. and Mrs. William Richie.

Carl didn't die just so the rest of us could continue to live, the chaplain said. He lived and fought and died "that we might lead lives that are decent and honest and just and kind; and if we all try to live such lives, we can be certain his sacrifice will not have been in vain."

#### Hope for Resurrection

The committal is the same in both Protestant and Catholic services. The bodies are lowered slowly toward the sea as the chaplain reads: "We therefore commit his body to the deep in the sure and certain hope of resurrection."

As he reads, the body slips quietly from beneath its American flag into the sea.

Then there is the Lord's prayer, and a benediction.

The shipmates stand by, silent and bareheaded, while a bugler sounds taps; and you can see some of them are very near tears.

#### Flags Are Saved

Then the executive officer himself—just about the most important man aboard ship—steps forward to receive the carefully folded flag. Carl's flag was saved for you, Mrs. Arbaugh; and the other for you, Mr. Schuetz.

No marble monuments, no raw earth mark the boys' graves—just the clean, beautiful, eternally restless Pacific. There were no flowers. None were needed. Each setting sun and each soft white moon for many thousands of years have been decorating this scene with the most vividly beautiful colors in the world.

It will always be that way, Mrs. Arbaugh and Mr. Schuetz.
