GERMANS CREATE SUPER-GESTAPO

London—(P)—The Germans, anticipating invasion within three weeks, have created an elaborate super-Gestapo in western Europe with lists of political unreliaables and prominent individuals marked for summary seizure, an informant with underground connections with Germany said today.

Von Woyrsch in Command

Hitler personally selected for command of this vast police force General Von Woyrsch, son of a German army commander in the last war and one of the Nazis' most notorious disciplinarians.

The minute the allies set foot upon the western shores of Europe, the Germans are said to be all set to begin one of the greatest mass roundups of the war with prospects that firing squads will have their hands full.

The informant said the program calls for the immediate arrest of prominent leaders in various parts of western Europe to be held as hostages and executed in case of hostility by the public.

Nazis Watch Norway

The Germans are said to be watching Norway as one of the likely invasion points. Stockholm dispatches told of a second German line of defense under construction on Jutland all the way from the east to the west coast.

Another Swedish report said the province of South Holland, including The Hague, had been declared a closed area that may be visited only by special permit.

Wallace Schuetz Is Killed In Action In South Pacific

A navy department telegram stating that their son, Wallace Schuetz, 22, an aviation machinist's mate, had been killed in action was received Saturday afternoon by Mr. and Mrs. George Schuetz, 1050 Third street, north. The youth had been an aerial gunner attached to a torpedo squadron operating in the south Pacific war theater.

The last word which his parents had received from Gunner 2/c Schuetz was in February, when he was in Hawaii, at which time he signified that he expected to leave soon for active missions in the Pacific.

He attended SS. Peter and Paul Catholic school here, graduated from Lincoln high school in 1939 and on August 14, 1942 he went to the navy recruiting depot at Wausau where he enlisted as a navy mechanic.

Besides his parents he is survived by a sister, Lillian, who works in Washington, and two brothers, James, an infantry private in Florida, and George jr., a Lincoln high school junior.

DESERTER FROM CANADIAN ARMY

Madison, Wis.—(P)—Sentencing of Clarence Kasner, 23, of Arpin, charged with violating the selective service act, was deferred by Federal Judge Patrick T. Stone today after Kasner testified he was a deserter from the Canadian army.

Kasner said he enlisted in the Canadian army, but fled after 16 days of service. He was arrested at Plattsburg, N. Y., and was registered with a Wood county draft board when he told police there that he was a resident of Arpin, the court record showed.

A warrant was issued when he failed to report for induction and on April 25 he entered a plea of innocent. After conferring with an attorney appointed by the court, Kasner decided to plead guilty today but Judge Stone, upon hearing testimony regarding his citizenship, instructed Francis Murphy, acting U. S. district attorney, to get in touch with Canadian authorities on the case.

"I don't see why this country should support you for the next four or five years," Judge Stone told the defendant. "Would you be willing to return voluntarily to Canada?" "No sir," Kasner replied.

Kasner said he had a wife and young child living in Canada but that his wife was seeking a divorce. He said it would be "against my conscience" to enter the United States armed forces.
