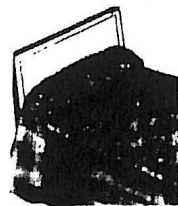

Leo J. Barrette, 480 Fifth street north, chairman of the municipal athletic field commission, was named Wisconsin Rapids' "Citizen of the Year" at the annual meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Monday evening.

The first annual citizenship award was announced by Ken Walker, Chamber president, who presented Barrette with an engraved plaque in recognition of his civic services to the community.

In conferring the award, Walker read the report of a special committee of the Chamber of Commerce composed of representatives of business, labor and local government. This secret committee was appointed a year ago to nominate the individual who, by his efforts in behalf of the community's interest, was deemed most deserving of the title, "Citizen of the Year."

The committee report read: "At the close of this year (1949) we were able to come to a unanimous decision because of the generally acknowledged accomplishment of the honored citizen. In recognition of years of service on the Wisconsin Rapids recreation commission, culminating in the very successful stadium fund campaign, the committee is proud to announce that Leo J. Barrette has been named the 1949 Wisconsin Rapids Citizen of the Year."

In accepting the award, Barrette acknowledged his grateful appreciation of the honor conferred upon him and expressed his wish to share it with "the grand team that helped put the stadium fund across."

Barrette then reviewed the stadium fund campaign conducted last fall to finance the 2,000 seat steel and concrete stadium which is now under construction at White ath-
