Squeeze On Lorraine

Patton's right and the flanking U. S. Seventh army squeezed down the German hold on northern Lorraine—the Karlsruhe corner—to a strip no more than 50 miles long and only five to 20 miles deep. His troops still poured through the original Saar bridgehead inside Saarlautern and through the second gap thrown in the Saar defenses south of that city last night. The exact locations of the assaults upon the Siegfried line itself were not specified.

Supreme headquarters regarded the four new Saar crossings as a single bridgehead, the third forged this week. All along the 50-mile front from Merzig to Saare Union, natural defenses of the Germans

group of long-term convicts, still in control of a segregation at the prison today and that authorities have not yet attempted to use force in breaking up the rebellion.

Two truck loads of soldiers from Ft. McPherson arrived at the prison this morning but the army refused they came only to use the rifle range for target practice. Soldiers stayed inside the prison for less than an hour and left.

James V. Bennett, director of prisons in Washington, aided efforts to persuade the convicts to release four prison officers held as hostages, said the situation was changed.

The segregation unit, a five-story structure, some 200 feet high, houses all newcomers until they have been given medical and physical examinations and assigned to a cell in the prison.

Only skimpy details of the segregation within the huge prison, which houses 2,000 convicts, were given by newsmen who kept vigil through the night at a nearby drugstore.

Bennett said that apparently rebellious convicts were not harmed and that none of the hostages, including junior custodial officers, had been harmed so far as could be determined.

A formal statement by the warden said the exact cause of the trouble had not been learned but that "some objection has been made to the quartering of German saboteurs and spies in the same building." Then, too, he added, "rebellious convicts are naturally testing their own segregation."

Greek Headquarter Taken by British

Athens—(AP)—A British commando tank and a platoon of soldiers seized headquarters of the left-wing EAM party by storm today as fighting spread through the central areas of Athens.

The Communist party building in Constitution Square also was seized. Parachute troopers forced the entrance with grenades, and 18 armed Communists there.
