Investigation Proper Attorney Says RFC Probe

Washington (AP)—Senator Murray (Mont.) today defended his prodding of the RFC \$1,000,000 to a Miami Fla. hotel for which his son, James Murray, was attorney. Murray said he did was "routine" and in line with established congressional practices.

He demanded that senate investigation should "cause to be published a complete listing of all calls, interviews and letters between the members of the senate and the agency (RFC) since its inception."

He said a committee developed yesterday that James Murray is a Washington lawyer, received \$21,000 in fees in connection with that and allied loans. He said his son's connection with the RFC, Senator Murray said: "I am a lawyer conducting legal and ethical services for his son and I can see no reason why I should treat him any differently than any other lawyer."

County Board Votes Cost-of-Living Bonus

A cost-of-living bonus of \$30 a month, retroactive to March 1, for all Wood county salaried employees and elective officials was approved by the county board of supervisors in session here this morning.

The resolution setting up the bonus plan, as drafted by the salary and grievance committee and adopted without a dissenting vote, provides for a semi-annual adjustment in the amount of the bonus, depending upon the rise or fall of the consumers' price index as published by the federal bureau of labor statistics.

Raise Officers' Salaries

In a companion resolution, the board also approved a salary increase of \$30 a month for all elective officials and the county highway commissioner, also effective March 1.

As explained by Supervisor Warren E. Beadle, Biron, chairman of the salary and grievance committee,

the bonus payments will be subject to adjustment upward or downward each January 1 and July 1 during the existing national emergency, depending upon the rise or fall of the consumers' price index. The index figures for each November 15 and May 15 preceding the adjustment dates shall govern.

The \$30 basic cost-of-living bonus is to be increased or decreased \$1 for each point of change upward or downward in the price index, with \$5 set as the maximum change permissible in either direction during any six-month period.

Other Resolutions Pending

Two other resolutions offered by the salary and grievance committee will be up for action at this afternoon's session of the board. One provides for this same cost-of-living bonus plan for the county superintendent of schools, the county supervising teachers, and the clerk in the county superintendent's office. The second provides for a \$30 monthly salary increase for the school superintendent.

The county board's educational committee disclosed this morning that it will introduce a resolution
