

Hijacker won't give up daughter

HAVANA (AP) — The estranged wife of an American hijacker seeking custody of the daughter her husband brought with him to Cuba nearly six months ago was surprised Monday night to find him and the child waiting at Havana airport to meet her.

But minutes before his wife arrived, Thomas George Washington told a newsman he would not give up the child.

After hugging her daughter, 3-year-old Jennifer, Mrs. Joanne Washington, 25, of Philadelphia, said she wanted to speak personally with Prime Minister Fidel Castro. She already has appealed to Castro by telegram.

Mrs. Washington arrived on a Cuban National Airlines flight from Mexico with a 30-day visa arranged through the Czechoslovak Embassy in Washington.

The embassy represents Cuban interests in the United States, which has no official relations with the Castro regime.

Mrs. Washington said seeing her husband was a surprise but she declined to say whether she would leave Cuba without her daughter.

A Swiss Embassy representative was present to meet her, but she left Havana's Jose Marti Airport with Washington, her daughter and a Cuban official for an undisclosed destination. The Swiss Embassy represents U.S. interests in Cuba.

Washington, a 27-year-old Negro chemist, appeared nervous but sat patiently with his daughter on his knee as his wife passed through Cuban customs.

He readily admitted to the newsman that he had hijacked an Eastern Airlines DC8 jet last Dec. 19 on a flight from Philadelphia to Miami. But he called it a "mercy mission" and "realty nothing."

At the time members of the DC8 crew reported the hijacker said he was doing it for his daughter's sake. Radio Havana later reported he used a toy gun to divert the plane with 151 persons aboard.

Washington said he hijacked the jet because he was disgusted with life in the United States. He has since been working in the Cuban Academy of Sciences and his daughter is attending a state kindergarten and speaking Spanish.

Washington said he was held in detention for 30 days after he arrived in Cuba and described his treatment as good but added: "It has its limitations."

Washington and his wife were separated before he came to Cuba. He took the daughter with him after a pre-Christmas visit to Philadelphia.

Market reports

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market continued in a steep decline early this afternoon in moderately active trading, with declines ahead of advances by better than 700 issues.

The Dow Jones industrial average at noon was off 11.51 at \$71.70.

Steels, aircrafts, electronics, utilities, and chemicals all were mostly lower.

Seventeen of the 20 most-active issues on the New York Stock Exchange were lower, 2 were higher, and 1 was unchanged.

Atlantic Richfield, most-active on 110,800 shares, was off 2 at 113 3/4.

Prices generally were lower on the American Stock Exchange, with 14 of the 20 most-active issues lower, 4 higher, and 2 unchanged.

Talks resume in brewery union dispute

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Representatives of 4,500 striking brewery workers prepared to resume contract talks today, saying negotiations could be as long as the city's storied beer supply is short.

Members of Local 9, United Brewery Workers, AFL-CIO, went on strike June 9 over wage and work rules issues, idling production at plants which make Miller, Pabst, Schlitz, Blatz and Gettelman beers.

The last round of talks broke down Saturday. Negotiators said they were not optimistic about a swift settlement.

Richard F. Meiden, president of the Metropolitan Milwaukee Liquor Retailers Association, said dealers' supplies have become "pretty depleted," adding: "I think it will be getting a little dry pretty soon."

Draft beer is becoming scarce in the beer capital. The dearth was blamed for causing a 30 percent reduction in gross sales of food and beverage during Milwaukee's annual Fourth of July festival—which is sponsored in part by Schlitz Brewing Co., and Meiden said dealers throughout the state who are also served by non-Milwaukee breweries are beginning to report shortages.

It is the union's first major Milwaukee walkout since 1953, when a 76-day strike dried up native beer, encouraged other breweries in Wisconsin to virtually double production, and led to extensive import of an estimated 50 non-Wisconsin brands.

More than 600 brewery workers began a walkout Sunday at the Pabst plant in Peoria, Ill.
