Fighters Healthier Than In World War 1

Washington. — (AP) — America's fighting men of today are healthier than those of World War I. Latest military medical reports, based on studies of diseases found among uniformed men and women of both the army and navy, show that modern preventive measures have held down to 3 per cent the number of army personnel made "non-effective" by illness at a given time, with a figure of 2 per cent for the navy. Despite extensive exposure to diseases virtually unknown to fighting men of the last war, distribution of sulfanamide and the application of various measures such as mosquito control and inoculations, have had a pronounced effect. One example of the reductions attained in World War II is the decrease in deaths from meningitis from about 30 per cent to about 3 per cent.

Receive Better Care

Battle Creek, Mich. — (AP) — American war wounded are not the "pale, septic patients of World War I" because they are better cared for than their fathers who fought in 1917, Lieut. Gen. Sir Alexander Hood, director general of the British army medical service, said Monday after an inspection of the army's Percy Jones General Hospital. Gen. Hood arrived here Sunday on a flying tour of the army's major medical installations in a company of Maj. Gen. Norman T.

Kirk, surgeon general of the U. S. army, and Brig. Gen. Raymond W. Bliss, assistant to Gen. Kirk. Gen. Hood, making his first visit to America, said in an interview to describe the "tremendous splendor of your army hospitals and their superb equipment and equally superb staffs."

Men In Fine Spirits

"In the last war, the patients in general hospitals were not the robust, healthy looking men we have seen here today," Gen. Hood declared. "They were pale and septic. Today we find them in fine spirits. That, I believe, is due to their early resuscitation, sulfa drugs and the better grade of surgery made available in evacuation hospitals close to the actual scene of battle."

Gen. Kirk said that "up to three weeks ago we had moved some 25,000 cases by air out of Tunisia, Sicily and Italy to general hospitals."

Both Gen. Hood and Gen. Kirk agreed that an increase had been noted in the number of amputations required in this war and explained that the increase was due to the enemy's use of land mines. "Pop" Champeau Returns From Parachute Band Service

Pfc. Edgar Champeau of Sheboygan arrived home Saturday from Camp Mackall, N. C., with a CDD (certified disability discharge), after serving in the U. S. army since October 6, 1942.

Pfc. Champeau reported at Fort Sheridan and was then sent to Fort Benning, Ga., as one of 28 men from Fort Sheridan picked for the first parachute band to be activated. From there he went to Camp Blanding, Fla., with seven other members of the band, to be placed with the "508" Parachute Regiment band. A short time later he was transferred to Fort Benning again and then to Camp Mackall, N. C., where he played at the dedication of this new camp which is entirely for air-borne troops. He remained at this camp until he was sent his holdings.

He received a fine write-up in the "Company News," camp newspaper, when he left, stating that there was no one in the entire band who was better known throughout the regiment than "Pop" Champeau. He was a drummer in the band.

Pfc. Champeau served in World War I for a few months near the end of the war and when the Armistice was signed he signed up for another three years. These three years he spent in Panama with a cavalry regiment. "Pop" is 45 years old, and he didn't want to leave the army, but the doctors decided he was a wee bit too old for parachute work and hence the discharge. Besides he is afflicted with arthritis which

makes it a little difficult to walk. His friends hated to see him go and he will be missed by the entire regiment. At the present time Pfc. Champeau is staying in Sheboygan just looking around and getting used to civilian life again. He hopes to find work here and again make his home in Sheboygan.

Limit Scope Of Gas Allowance For Procuring Food

Washington. — (AP) — The Office of Price Administration today limited the scope of provisions allowing special gasoline rations for procuring necessary food.

Persons residing at great distances from market centers continue to be eligible for special rations if they cannot obtain supplies on the non-occupational mileage in their "A" books. The amendment specifically excludes persons desiring mileage to obtain food for the operation of a business or occupation. In such cases, qualifications for supplementary rations is on an occupational basis. Also banned are special rations to transport food to temporary or seasonal homes when residence in them is not required by occupation. The amendment is effective October 23.

Sgt. Procknow Of Oshkosh Honored

Calif. — (AP) — Sgt. John J. Procknow of Oshkosh, Wis., has been awarded the Legion of Merit by Maj. Gen. Ralph Royce of the American Middle Eastern Air Force for work in forecasting weather with inadequate equipment and untrained personnel. Gen. Royce, who also honored four other men, commended them for "greatly advancing" the work of U. S. big bombers during the battle of North Africa and subsequent forays in the Mediterranean area.

Wisconsin Ranks 35th In Drive For Bond Purchases

Washington. — (AP) — Final breakdown of figures for the Third War Loan Drive, released by the treasury department last night, showed Wisconsin in 35th place with 116 per cent of its quota sold, although the individual goal was short 5 per cent.

With a quota of 288 millions, the state sold 346 millions. Corporation sales were 246 millions, compared with a quota of 195, and individual sales — 95 per cent of the quota, were 98 millions against a goal of 193 millions.

Restrict Delivery Of Dock Coal To Commercial Users

Washington. — (AP) — Restricted delivery of coal to commercial users supplied by Great Lakes docks was ordered yesterday by the Solid Fuels Administration. The order makes no change in the status of coal delivered for domestic space heating. The SFA order directed that the docks are to deliver only enough by-product and special purpose coals to carry consumers through to June 15, 1944, while deliveries of other commercial coals were restricted to a supply sufficient to last through May 31, 1944.

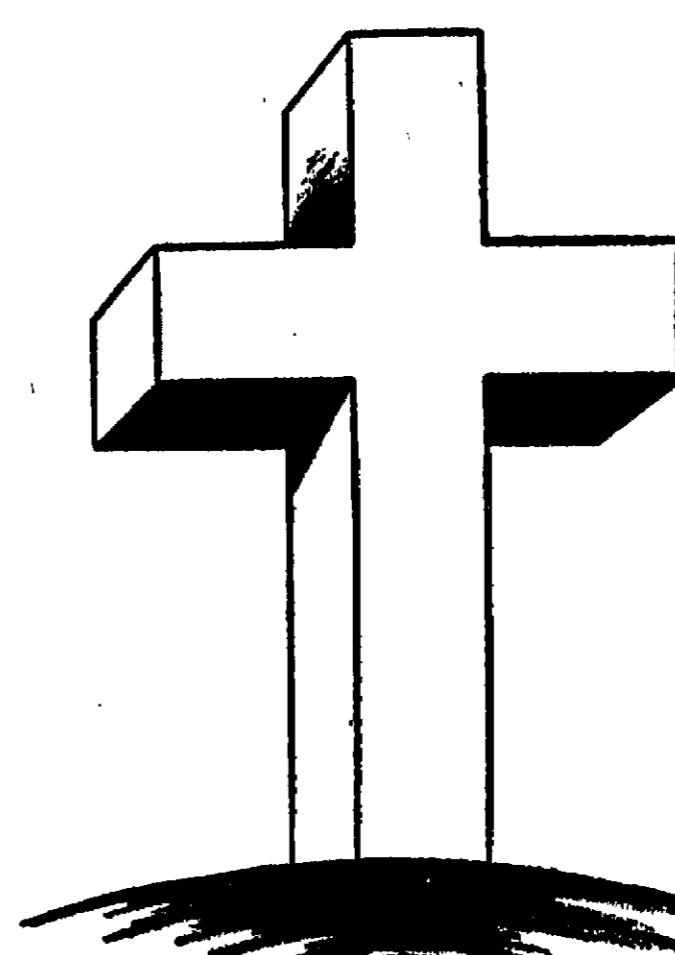
