

Power Plant Rebuilds and Modernizes

Due to the severe wind storms of June 22 and August 15 the Nekoosa-Edwards Light and Power company were busy during the last half of 1944 rebuilding and modernizing certain sections of their lines. Most of the damage suffered from both storms was in Nekoosa and outlying rural areas on lines of considerable age.

Expansion of rural distribution lines were held at a minimum be-

ines were held at a minimum because of the war production board restrictions which still remain in effect. Some rebuilding of urban distribution lines was done, this work being allowed by the W.P.B. 🥻 where increased load had overtaxed 🕺 the existing lines. The rural Cranmoor extension,

which was built in 1932 as a 3phase, 2300 Volt line, has gained considerably in customers and load during the last five years and the utility has the W.P.B. approval to change this line to 6900 primary oltage. This line is about 18 miles in length with the large loads on better voltage regulation and service is expected for the cranberry growers.

Employees are all part time, dividing their time between the Utility and Paper company.
