NEW WAR PLANTS LACK MANPOWER

Washington—(P)—Seven brand new west coast aluminum plant units able to turn out 21,000,000 pounds of the vital metal monthly have been idle for lack of manpower since their completion months ago, it was learned today at the war production board (WPB).

Many Workers Quit Enough workers to do the job have been hired but quit, explained a WPB official who said: "All seven units, located in labor-light areas and operated by the Aluminum Company of America, need only a total of 1,000 workers to do the task for which they were built by the government at a cost of millions of dollars."

Haven't Produced an Ounce "They have not turned out an ounce of the 21 million pounds monthly they were expected to produce. Meanwhile, other similar units are being completed elsewhere."

He explained further: "Idleness of these west coast 'reduction' units is tying up power facilities set up for them by one of the nation's greatest dams. No attempt to convert that power to other uses can be made while it is possible for the aluminum manpower needs to be met."

With the AEF at Troina, Aug. 6—(Delayed)—(P)—The sun was dropping behind the Sicilian hills on the fifth day of the battle for Troina when Lt. Stan Mastyl, Philadelphia, gathered his seven-man patrol together in a vineyard at the edge of no man's land.

Attack Night After Night Night after night tired American troops (Terry Allen's fighting First division) attacked. Sometimes they managed to cling to a ridge, sometimes they were shoved back and had to come out of their foxholes and trenches to try again.

"Don't Try to Fight!" "No, don't try to fight. There are too few of you." "Ok, Goodbye sir."

"When you come back if you manage to get into the town—give L and K companies directions on how to reach Troina," Horner said. "Do you want me to fight if we meet anyone? Each man is carrying a bandolier of ammunition and one hand grenade. We are traveling light."

Terrifying, Yet Fascinating We watched the first plane roaring towards us. It was fascinating and terrifying at once to see the bombs hurtle from the belly of the plane. The fins caught the air and the bomb leveled out. It crashed into the vineyard above us near where the snipers had been.

Another Dived In and Then Another We lay in the ditch holding our breath, making ourselves as small as possible. "For God's sake," Booth shouted, "don't anyone move."

U.S. General Warns Japs of Air Raids

(By the Associated Press)

Japan, fearful that a second U. S. attack on her Kurile island chain presaged raids on the Japanese mainland itself, has been warned by an American air commander that even greater aerial blows are to come in the Pacific.

Maj. Gen. Nathan F. Twining, commander of air activities in the Solomons, asserted that there would be no lull, and that the Pacific offensive has reached "the second quarter of the game with our forces possessing the ball and with an impressive score behind them."

Two Liberators were reported missing. Tokyo broadcasts warned the Japanese people that the United States apparently was preparing to "raid our mainland, Japan, from the north."

Bad weather grounded airplanes as U. S. troops fought in the jungles to wipe out the last Japanese holdings at Bairoko harbor on New Georgia island, and a communication reported only that "our ground advance continues."

Blockading warcraft sank a Japanese auxiliary vessel last night in Blackett strait leading into Kula gulf. The blockade is choking off help for Bairoko harbor's defenders from the sea.
